- Defining the term, a pre-written questions which can be administered on paper, <u>via the post or</u> the internet or via a structured interview in special cases (though structured interviews are generally seen as a different methodology)
- The strengths of questionnaires this should be explained in the context of key methodology concerns such as
  - Depth
  - Reliability
  - Standardisation
  - Response rates
  - Ease of collation
  - Size of samples/representativeness
  - Can be analysed through computer designs
- The weaknesses of questionnaires this should be explained in the context of key methodological concerns such as
  - Validity
  - Expense of creating and printing
  - Lacks depth
  - Unintentional bias
  - Design issues
  - Non-response/representativeness

Answers which limit themselves to discussions of ethnicity alone may be narrow, but should be credited if they focus on culture and refer to a range of studies.
