Travelling Players using 'pageants', that is, movable stage wagons, were able to present vigorous, spectacular drama. Discuss the nature of the Drama they presented and the elaborate effects they had at their disposal.

OR

What is a Morality play and how does it differ from the Mystery/Miracle plays that preceded it? Discuss the dramatic form with reference to at least one Morality play.
