	<ul> <li>People can keep in contact with their family and friends (1) irrespective of wherever they are (1)</li> <li>Fund raising and good causes can benefit from social media campaigns (1) such as Stephen Sutton raising money for Teenage Cancer Trust (1)</li> <li>People can raise awareness of areas of concern (1) on environmental (1) and human rights issues (1)</li> <li>Can be a catalyst for change (1) such as the Arab Spring (1)</li> <li>People are becoming less active (1) and end up with health problems as a result of the loss of physical activity (1)</li> <li>Loss of human interaction (1) and lose the ability to interact with one another (1)</li> <li>People potentially becoming more susceptible to radicalisation (1) and join terrorist / criminal organisations (1)</li> <li>Growth of on-line bullying (1) and vulnerable people could be put at risk of self- harming (1)</li> <li>Vulnerable people potentially placed at risk of being exploited (1) and subject to physical, emotional or sexual abuse (1)</li> </ul>	(2)

10	<ul> <li>Answers might refer to: <ul> <li>When arrested there must be reasonable grounds (1) such as matching the description of someone who has committed a crime (1)</li> <li>When in prison / custody individuals must not be discriminated against (1) on the grounds of ethnic background / sexual orientation / religion (1)</li> <li>When arrested or detained individuals must be treated humanely (1) given food /allowed to sleep (1)</li> <li>Legal representation (1) throughout the prosecution (1)</li> <li>A fair trial (1) with impartial judiciary (1)</li> <li>Appropriate custodial care (1) including provision of medication where necessary (1)</li> </ul> </li> <li>Award 1 mark for identifying each measure and 1 mark for the development up to a maximum of 4 marks.</li> <li>Award any other valid responses to measure or development.</li> </ul>	(4)

11(b)	<ul> <li>Answers might refer to:         <ul> <li>provide safe working environments for employees (1) in order to satisfy health and safety legislation (1)</li> <li>provide training (1) in order to ensure that employees are familiar with codes of practice (1)</li> <li>enable redress (1) in the event of grievances (1)</li> </ul> </li> <li>Award 1 mark for identifying the responsibility and 1 further mark for development.</li> <li>Award marks for other valid responses.</li> </ul>	(2)

12	<ul> <li>Answers might refer to:         <ul> <li>Not discriminate against those working for the public services (1) such as insisting to see someone of the same race / gender when making a general enquiry (1)</li> <li>Respect the human rights of those working for the public services (1) such as not using threatening or abusive behaviour (1)</li> <li>Supply information that is verifiable and accurate (1) such as providing your name and address when asked by a public service employee (1)</li> <li>Not attempt to defraud public service providers (1) by accessing services/ benefits they are not entitled to (1)</li> <li>Award marks for identifying the responsibility and 1 mark for the development up to a maximum of 2 marks.</li> <li>Award marks for other valid responses</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

14(b)	<ul> <li>Answers might refer to:</li> <li>Reflect the composition of the communities that the public services serve (1)</li> <li>Attract new employees (1)</li> <li>Retaining existing employees (1)</li> <li>Improving public confidence / faith in the public services (1)</li> <li>Example answer</li> <li>By following equal opportunities policies public service organisations promote the idea of diversity. (1) This reinforces the idea that they are able to meet the needs of the communities which they serve. (1) However this imposes costs (1) on the organisation which might otherwise be spent on providing services. (1)</li> </ul>	(4)

15 (a)	Answers might refer to:  • mobile phone traffic (1)  • e-mails (1)  • CCTV (1)  • Automatic number plate recognition (ANPR) (1)  Example answer The police use of ANPR cameras (1) enables them to automatically check to make sure the car has valid insurance / tax / MOT (1)  Award 1 mark for identifying the method and 1 mark for explaining the method, up to a maximum of 2 marks  Award marks for other valid responses	(2)
15 (b)	<ul> <li>Answers might refer to: <ul> <li>Increased security (1) enables the police / security services to keep citizens safe (1)</li> <li>Citizens feel safer (1) when they see CCTV cameras (1)</li> <li>Leads to increased police efficiency (1) and reduce the cost of policing (1)</li> <li>Protection from terrorism (1) enables security services to monitor mobile phone messages / emails (1)</li> <li>Considered an infringement of human rights (1) as it deprives citizens of a right to privacy (1)</li> <li>Reduced sense of security (1) as fewer police officer are on patrol (1)</li> </ul> </li> <li>Award 1 mark for identifying impact and a further 1 mark for expanding each point, up to a maximum of 4 marks</li> </ul>

Number 16	Answers might refer to:  How public services promote good citizenship  • promoting values and standards for self and others by using suitable language  • showing fairness, respect, discipline and empathy to others  • participation in community activities  • encouraging volunteering / supporting charitable organisations  • challenging injustice	
	<ul> <li>protecting the environment</li> <li>promotes equality and diversity as fundamental values of citizenship,</li> <li>promotes awareness of importance of community to all members of society</li> <li>promotes participation of all members of society</li> <li>acting as role models</li> <li>the need for all members of society to protect individuals, especially those who are vulnerable</li> <li>helping the community and the public services to work together (e.g. Neighbourhood Watch coordinators)</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>cases of public service employees acting inappropriately can undermine the attempt by the public services to promote good citizenship</li> <li>over enthusiasm can cause volunteers / good citizens to over extend themselves</li> <li>where public service organisations fall below public expectations this undermines their ability to promote good citizenship</li> <li>Examples of cases will be credited</li> </ul>
