Nutrients must be provided in the diet for the body to function correctly Seven different nutrients needed for a balanced diet Carbohydrates for energy Fibre for bulk and movement through digestive tract Protein for amino acids to make body protein such as cells, tissues, enzymes, hormones, muscle, hair, etc. Lipids/fats for stored energy plus insulation and protection of organs Vitamins for specific chemical reactions in cells Minerals for bones and teeth, osmoregulation, nerve transmission, muscle contraction, etc. Water, which makes up to 75% of bodyweight, involved in chemical reactions and transporting chemicals, regulating body temperature and removing waste products	8
