

You must research the law relating to the extracts in the **Part A** Set Task Information.

You need to know about the different types of homicide (murder, voluntary manslaughter and involuntary manslaughter) and police powers.

You need to know about the law relating to offences against property and any general defences that may be raised.

In **Part B** you will need to apply your research to the new information provided.

Using this **Part A** booklet, you may prepare short notes to refer to when completing the Set Task in **Part B**, for example on specific cases. Your notes may be up to two sides of A4. Your notes must only contain details of legal principles and authorities, such as case law and statute law.

You should spend no more than six hours on this research.

Part A Set Task Information

Article 1 – Homicide

Man questioned in connection with fatal stabbing of a rival football fan

Football fan Colin Rogers, aged 54, is being questioned by police after it was alleged that he deliberately stabbed a rival fan outside a football stadium last week. The victim, Thomas Craig, had gone home following the incident and was found dead by his mother the next morning.

Article 2 – Offences against Property

Bank worker charged over text message scam

Aaliyah Ahmed, a customer services representative at Prestlake Bank, was charged this morning for sending out false text messages claiming to be from the bank. It is alleged that she was trying to gain access to her victims' accounts so that she could take their money.

Activity 1: Homicide

Refer to your notes for the preparatory work completed in **Part A** and the new information provided in **Activity 1 – Homicide Case Facts** of the Set Task Information.

You are shadowing a barrister who has been instructed by a solicitor to prepare a brief for a homicide that occurred outside a football stadium.

Prepare a brief for the given case that:

- shows your understanding of the law relevant to homicide and the exercise of police powers
- shows how the law relating to homicide and the exercise of police powers apply to this case
- establishes the likely outcomes of the case.

(Total for Activity 1 = 36 marks)

Activity 2: Offences against Property

Refer to your notes for the preparatory work completed in **Part A** and the new information provided in **Activity 2 – Offences against Property Case Facts** of the Set Task Information.

The barrister you are shadowing is also preparing a case for her client, Aaliyah Ahmed, who has been charged in connection with a text message scam.

Produce a report for the case file that:

- shows your understanding of the law relating to the relevant property offence(s) and any possible defence that might be raised
- shows how the law relating to offences against property and any possible defence would apply to this case
- · establishes the likely outcomes of the case.

Set Task Information

Activity 1 – Homicide Case Facts

Colin Rogers was arrested on Thursday following the death of Thomas Craig who was found dead at his home that morning.

Colin had been seen on CCTV stabbing Thomas outside Burrowdale City's stadium following a football match.

Investigations of the incident by the police established the following facts:

- Colin and Thomas were supporters of rival football teams. The two teams had played a match on the day of the incident.
- Colin was known to carry a pocket knife with him to all matches.
- On the day of the incident, Colin's team had lost. Colin had made it clear to fellow fans that he would stab any fan from the other team who taunted him about losing.
- After the match, Thomas was heard shouting at Colin that his team were awful and deserved to lose.
- Colin was then seen running after Thomas as he left the stadium. When Colin caught up with Thomas, he stabbed him twice and ran off.
- Seeing that he had been injured so badly, Thomas's friends tried to convince him to go to hospital. Thomas insisted he would be fine and, if he felt any worse, he would go to the hospital. He went home.
- Thomas was found by his mother the next morning lying unresponsive in his bed. His mother rang for an ambulance. When paramedics arrived, they identified that Thomas had suffered serious internal injuries and pronounced him dead at the scene.

During his initial interviews with his solicitor, Colin is alleging that he was not treated fairly by the police when they interviewed him. He has raised the following points:

- His initial request to see a lawyer was refused.
- The police only started recording the interview after an hour of questioning.
- He was interviewed continuously by the police over an eight-hour period.

Activity 2 – Offences against Property Case Facts

Aaliyah Ahmed was charged by police after her manager at Prestlake Bank reported her for sending out false text messages pretending to be from the bank.

During questioning by the police, the following facts were established:

- Aaliyah was found using her work computer to send out text messages to customers.
 The text messages stated that they needed to change their password to their online banking and contained a link to the bank's website so that they could do this.
- The link directed customers to a fake website. If they had entered their details then Aaliyah would have been able to gain access to their bank accounts.
- The manager caught Aaliyah and was able to inform customers before any of them had entered any personal information. Therefore, no money or personal details were obtained. Her manager then rang the police.

Aaliyah admitted to sending out the false text messages. However, in her defence she claims that:

- She was forced into doing this by Rick, a friend that she borrowed money from.
- When she told Rick that she was unable to pay him, he suddenly became violent. He told her that unless she set up the text message scam to get him some money, he would make her elderly mother 'suffer'.
- She says that she would have contacted the police, however Rick was following her and sending her text messages on a daily basis saying he was watching her and her family.
