**SECTION A**

**Read the following scenario carefully. The questions in this section relate to this scenario.**

**Answer ALL questions. Write your answers in the spaces provided.**

Ben is a 14-year-old boy. The headteacher at his school is meeting with Ben's mother. He explains that Ben is doing well in some subjects, including Maths and Science, but not in other subjects like Art. In this way, Ben is very different from his sister, Alice, who is doing GCSE Art. The headteacher is worried as Ben is one of a group of boys who do not clear away their rubbish at lunchtimes. These boys have been heard to say that clearing up after meals is 'girls' work'. Ben's mother says she is surprised to hear this as he is always helpful around the house; this weekend he helped his Dad to put up some shelves.

**1** Psychologists could use the social approach to explain Ben's behaviour.

Give **one** key assumption from the social approach.

**2** (a) State the meaning of social categorisation.

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(b) Give **one** example of social categorisation.

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**(Total for Question 2 = 2 marks)**

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Ben strongly believes subjects like Art are 'for girls' whilst subjects such as Maths are 'for boys'. Ben remembers his previous marks for Maths as being better than they really were. This effect was studied by Chartard et al (2007).

- 3 Explain why the Chartard et al (2007) study could be used to understand Ben's memory of his marks for Maths.

- 4 Explain **one** type of conformity that could be a reason for Ben's behaviour at lunchtimes.

**Read the following scenario carefully. The questions in this section relate to this scenario.**

**Answer ALL questions. Write your answers in the spaces provided.**

Janet owns a coffee shop. She wants to attract customers to the shop more often and encourage them to buy food as well as drinks. Janet will give customers a free biscuit when they buy a hot drink. She will also reduce the price of cakes for the rest of the month. Janet will put up posters outside the shop to advertise her cake offer. The posters have the words 'Coffee & Cake' on them in big letters. Janet has had some paper napkins made that have a picture of a cup of coffee next to a piece of cake.

**9** Psychologists could use the learning approach to explain Janet's decisions.

Give **one** key assumption from the learning approach.

Psychologists think that several kinds of priming can influence behaviour.

**10** Give **one** example of associative priming from the scenario.

**11** Describe, using operant conditioning, how the free biscuit will encourage people to visit the coffee shop more often.

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**12** Describe, using classical conditioning, how reducing the price of cakes for the rest of the month will encourage people to buy more cakes.

Janet is pleased when her customers give her good reviews online.

**13** State the meaning of social proof.

Janet was still not selling many cakes. She decided to invite some of her friends to the shop to eat free cakes at busy times. Now sales of cakes have improved.

**14** Explain, using social learning theory, **one** reason why sales of cakes have now improved.

The TV news claims that the man has been in trouble before and he has several family members, including a brother, who have served prison sentences for aggressive crimes. During the man's interview, he told the police he had been playing a violent video game just before he committed the crime.

- 17** Some people believe that playing a violent video game before the robbery may have caused the man to commit the crime.

Give **one** concept from the cognitive approach to understanding aggression that could support this belief.

- 18** Describe what psychologists mean by fundamental attribution error.

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Reconstructive theory suggests that eyewitnesses of the violent robbery may not give accurate descriptions of what they saw.

**19** Explain why eyewitness descriptions of the violent robbery may not have been accurate. Use **two** concepts from reconstructive memory in your answer.

**21** Explain **one** strength of the case study of Phineas Gage (Harlow,1868).
