
Scenario

Puddles Equestrian is a competition yard that has 25 horses, which are stabled at night. It has four turnout paddocks for daily turnout around the horses' exercise schedules. It also has an indoor and outdoor manège and a cross country course.

When they are in full health and condition, all the horses at Puddles Equestrian regularly go off site to competitions.

Puddles Equestrian has three full-time members of staff including yourself. You are the yard supervisor and in this role you manage the day-to-day running of the yard. This role includes care and husbandry of the horses, health checking, grooming, mucking out, feeding, training, management of disease and parasites, and record keeping.

You have also been asked to evaluate the past management of equine disease and make recommendations for improvement.

For use with Activity 1

Horse 1

Popcorn is a 14.2 hh, 12-year-old gelding who is normally in good health. He is stabled at night and turned out during the day around his exercise. Popcorn is kept in a 12 ft by 12 ft stable with a shavings bed. When you are catching Popcorn from the field, you see him scratching his head near his ears on the fence. When leading him in, he is shaking his head a lot and will not let you touch near his ears.

Horse 2

Biscuit is a 15 hh, seven-year-old mare who is stabled on wheat straw, fed unsoaked hay, provided with one-hour turnout per day and in light exercise. Riders have reported Biscuit is not performing as usual and occasionally coughing when doing light exercise. When health checking her in the stable at rest, you notice she is heaving, coughing and has an increased respiratory rate.

For use with Activity 2

Pepper is a 15 hh cob gelding who has been at Puddles Equestrian for a year and has been diagnosed with mud fever. It is winter so he is stabled at night and has several hours per day of turnout. He has been put on the following disease management plan.

Name: Pepper				
Disease/condition: mud fever				
Feed: one scoop of course mix morning and night and large haylage morning and night. Turnout with good grazing				
Grooming: Pepper needs a full groom daily and pick out of his hooves morning and night. Hose legs off with water if muddy				
Health check morning: full health check including legs and hooves Health check evening: full health check including legs and hooves				
Treatment: apply barrier ointment before turnout, brush off before reapplying the following day				
Turnout: field 3 from 8.00 am until 3.00 pm				
Cleaning: Pepper has rubber matting that needs to have droppings removed and be hosed daily				
Additional comments: continue to exercise as normal				

For use with Activity 3

One of the horses at Puddles Equestrian, Tommy, has recently been off the yard to an endurance event with a lot of other horses from other locations.

Tommy is a 14.1 hh, part-bred Welsh gelding, is in good health and regularly attends endurance competitions and pleasure rides around the UK. Tommy is stabled in box 1 and turned out daily. However, he developed circular lesions on his body and was diagnosed by the vet as having ringworm. He has been moved into isolation stable 2, and turned out during the day in the isolation paddock.

Below is the disease management and care plan that has been put in place.

Tommy's disease management and care plan

Name: Tommy

Disease/condition: ringworm

Location: isolation stable 2

Environmental conditions: turned out daily

wooden stable with wooden half door concrete floor and straw bedding natural and artificial lighting

Routine care, husbandry and monitoring: muck out morning and night

one scoop pony nuts morning and night ad lib haylage morning and night full groom and pick out feet daily rugs both in stable and paddock as he is clipped wash affected areas with anti-fungal wash using a sponge

do not exercise until better to prevent spreading to other horses

Biosecurity measures: keep in isolation stables and turn out in isolation field

Pasture management: poo pick daily

Additional comments: only specified isolation groom to care for Tommy. He must be done before all other horses and the groom must wear gloves
