1 Using any standard results given in the List of Formulae (MF20), show that

$$\sum_{r=1}^{n} (r^2 - r + 1) = \frac{1}{3}n(n^2 + 2)$$

for all positive integers *n*.

- 2 Find the area enclosed by the curve with polar equation $r = \sin \theta + \cos \theta$, $0 \le \theta \le \frac{1}{2}\pi$. [4]
- (i) Given that $y = \sqrt{\sinh x}$ for $x \ge 0$, express $\frac{dy}{dx}$ in terms of y only. 3 [3]

(ii) Find
$$\int \frac{2t}{\sqrt{1+t^4}} \, \mathrm{d}t.$$
 [3]

- The curve *C* has equation $y = \frac{x+1}{x^2+3}$. 4
 - (i) By considering a suitable quadratic equation in x, find the set of possible values of y for points on *C*. [5]
 - (ii) Deduce the coordinates of the turning points on C.
- 5 (i) Write down the 2×2 matrices which represent the following plane transformations:
 - (a) an anticlockwise rotation about the origin through an angle α ;
 - (**b**) a reflection in the line $y = x \tan(\frac{1}{2}\beta)$. [2]
 - (ii) A reflection in the x-y plane in the line $y = x \tan(\frac{1}{2}\theta)$ is followed by a reflection in the line $y = x \tan(\frac{1}{2}\phi)$. Show that the composition of these two reflections (in this order) is a rotation and describe this rotation fully. [6]
- 6 A group G has order 12.
 - (i) State, with a reason, the possible orders of the elements of G.

The identity element of G is e, and x and y are distinct, non-identity elements of G satisfying the three conditions

> (1) x has order 6, (2) $x^3 = y^2$, (3) xyx = y.

(ii) Prove that $yx^2y = x$.	[3]

(iii) Prove that G is not a cyclic group.

- 7 (i) Use de Moivre's theorem to show that $\tan 4\theta = \frac{4t(1-t^2)}{1-6t^2+t^4}$, where $t = \tan \theta$. [5]
 - (ii) Given that θ is the acute angle such that $\tan \theta = \frac{1}{5}$, express $\tan 4\theta$ as a rational number in its simplest form, and verify that

$$\frac{1}{4}\pi + \tan^{-1}\left(\frac{1}{239}\right) = 4\tan^{-1}\left(\frac{1}{5}\right).$$

8 The function f satisfies the differential equation

$$x^{2} f''(x) + (2x - 1)f'(x) - 2f(x) = 3e^{x-1} + 1, \qquad (*)$$

and the conditions f(1) = 2, f'(1) = 3.

- (i) Determine f''(1). [2]
- (ii) Differentiate (*) with respect to x and hence evaluate f''(1). [4]
- (iii) Hence determine the Taylor series approximation for f(x) about x = 1, up to and including the term in $(x-1)^3$. [3]
- (iv) Deduce, to 3 decimal places, an approximation for f(1.1). [2]

9 (i) Show that the substitution
$$u = \frac{1}{y^3}$$
 transforms the differential equation $\frac{dy}{dx} + y = 3xy^4$ into
 $\frac{du}{dx} - 3u = -9x.$ [3]

(ii) Solve the differential equation $\frac{dy}{dx} + y = 3xy^4$, given that $y = \frac{1}{2}$ when x = 0. Give your answer in the form $y^3 = f(x)$. [9]

10 The line *L* has equation
$$\mathbf{r} = \begin{pmatrix} 1 \\ -3 \\ 2 \end{pmatrix} + \lambda \begin{pmatrix} 3 \\ 4 \\ 6 \end{pmatrix}$$
 and the plane Π has equation $\mathbf{r} \cdot \begin{pmatrix} 2 \\ -6 \\ 3 \end{pmatrix} = k$.

- (i) Given that L lies in Π , determine the value of k.
- (ii) Find the coordinates of the point, Q, in Π which is closest to P(10, 2, -43). Deduce the shortest distance from P to Π . [5]
- (iii) Find, in the form ax + by + cz = d, where *a*, *b*, *c* and *d* are integers, an equation for the plane which contains both *L* and *P*. [6]

- 11 The complex number $w = (\sqrt{3} 1) + i(\sqrt{3} + 1)$.
 - (i) Determine, showing full working, the exact values of |w| and arg w. [4] [You may use the result that $\tan(\frac{5}{12}\pi) = 2 + \sqrt{3}$.]
 - (ii) (a) Find, in the form $re^{i\theta}$, the three roots, z_1 , z_2 and z_3 , of the equation $z^3 = w$. [4]
 - (b) Determine $z_1 z_2 z_3$ in the form a + ib.
 - (c) Mark the points representing z_1 , z_2 and z_3 on a sketch of the Argand diagram. Show that they form an equilateral triangle, Δ_1 , and determine the side-length of Δ_1 . [5]
 - (d) The points representing kz_1 , kz_2 and kz_3 form Δ_2 , an equilateral triangle which is congruent to Δ_1 , and one of whose vertices lies on the positive real axis. Write down a suitable value for the complex constant k. [1]

12 (i) Let
$$I_n = \int_0^3 x^n \sqrt{16 + x^2} \, dx$$
, for $n \ge 0$. Show that, for $n \ge 2$,
 $(n+2)I_n = 125 \times 3^{n-1} - 16(n-1)I_{n-2}.$ [6]

- (ii) A curve has polar equation $r = \frac{1}{4}\theta^4$ for $0 \le \theta \le 3$.
 - (a) Sketch this curve. [2]
 - (b) Find the exact length of the curve.
- 13 Define the *repunit number*, R_n , to be the positive integer which consists of a string of n 1's. Thus,

$$R_1 = 1$$
, $R_2 = 11$, $R_3 = 111$, ..., $R_7 = 1111111$, ..., etc.

Use induction to prove that, for all integers $n \ge 5$, the number

 $13579 \times R_{n}$

contains a string of (n-4) consecutive 7's.
