A comment plus an extension would deserve 2 marks. a warden would check that people didn't cause damage (2) there should be signs in pertinent places (2) the pathways should be planned in such a way as if one is being overused it can be temporarily blocked to give it chance to recover (2) An information hut at the beginning of the nature trail will give out pamphlets (2) School groups must be on a ratio of 1 teacher per 10 (children (2) Fencing in appropriate place will guide people in a particular direction (2) CCTV in specific places (2)	(6)

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
