# **POISON PLASTIC**

Every year, around 500 billion plastic bags are used worldwide.

Over one million bags are being used every minute and they're damaging our environment. Put another way, every man, woman and child on our planet uses 83 plastic bags every year.



# **Pollution**

Plastic bags are difficult and costly to recycle and many end up on landfill sites. They then take around 300 years to rot away. They break down into tiny particles that poison the soil and waterways. When animals accidentally eat them, they enter the food chain. We use plastic bags unnecessarily and this causes increasing damage to our planet.

Big black bin liners, plastic carrier bags and clear sandwich bags are all polluting our environment. They're lightweight, handy and too easily thrown away.

Plastic bags can be seen hanging from the branches of trees, flying in the air on windy days and floating on rivers. They block up gutters and drains causing water and sewage to overflow and become the breeding grounds of germs and bacteria that cause diseases. Many end up in the sea.

# **Dangers to Sea Life**

Plastic bags are now amongst the top 12 items of rubbish found along coastlines. Animals and sea creatures are hurt and killed every day by plastic bags because they think they are food. Plastic blocks their insides and leads to slow starvation. Other creatures get tangled up in plastic

bags and drown. A dead turtle with a plastic bag hanging from its mouth isn't a pleasant sight.

Because plastic bags take hundreds of years to break down, every year our seas become 'home' to more and more bags. Every bag that's washed down a drain during rainfall ends up in the sea. Every bag that's flushed down a toilet ends up in the sea. Every bag that's blown into a river will most likely end up in the sea.


