Read **Source A**. You have been asked to find out how successful this factsheet is in getting information across by answering the questions which follow.

Source A

Working as an Optician



An optician's job is to help people with poor eyesight see clearly again. As people get older, their vision usually gets steadily worse. Opticians are hugely important in looking after these people. An eye specialist tests someone's eyesight and writes a prescription containing the information needed to correct their eyesight. Then an optician uses this information to make up and fit the lenses.

There are around 4,000 opticians working in the UK. Since people are now living longer, more people are likely to need help with their eyesight. Therefore, the job is becoming more important and there will be a need for more opticians in the future.

Salary

An optician starting out can expect to earn a yearly salary of £18,000–£20,000. With a few years' experience an optician can earn £25,000–£30,000 per year.

Responsibilities

An optician uses special equipment to fit people with the correct type of lens. Glasses must be fitted to the patient's head level with the eyes. Contact lenses have to be fitted to the patient's eyeball. Once the lenses have been made up, an optician tests how well they work on the patient.

Opticians must give advice and support to customers. They handle questions about glasses and give advice about style.

Qualifications

To become an optician you could study full-time for three years or part-time on day release. There are some degrees available. You should have at least 5 GCSEs in subjects such as English, Maths and Science.

You will be dealing with the public so it is important you have good people skills. People need help to make the right choice about their glasses as these can be fashion items too. So, an optician also needs an eye for detail, colour and style.

Working Conditions

Opticians usually work five days a week. Working hours are usually nine to five, along with late openings on Thursdays and Saturday working too.

Guide Dogs is a charity which has been breeding and training guide dogs for more than 80 years.



Could a Guide Dog help you?

If you are blind or partially sighted, a guide dog could change your life.

There's no upper age limit. People in their seventies, eighties and nineties have become successful guide dog owners. We also work with those under the age of 16. In 2014, an 11-yearold became our youngest guide dog owner.

You don't need to have lost all your sight. Most people who own a guide dog still have some vision. You don't need to be officially registered as blind or partially sighted either.



Worried about the cost?

It costs just 50p to have a guide dog. All essential equipment and training is provided by Guide Dogs and we can also cover the cost of vet bills and dog food.

No previous experience of keeping or caring for a dog is necessary. It's not just about improving your mobility. A guide dog and its owner exist as a partnership, and the companionship, loyalty and fun that each partner brings to this relationship can be immensely rewarding.



Volunteers Needed!

Guide Dogs is currently looking for loving, caring homes for our guide dog mums with volunteers to be responsible for their day to day care. You will have 24 hour support and advice from the staff at our National Breeding Centre in Leamington Spa.

The female dog in your care would be mated approximately once a year at the breeding centre. She would then give birth in your home. The puppies will spend the first six weeks with their mum, with support from you. You will need a car and must live reasonably close to our breeding centre. These dogs require a lot of care and attention especially once they have had their pups. Therefore, you should not be in full-time work.


