

Social networking today

'Using social networking sites rather than actually meeting up with people could cause serious problems,' says psychologist Dr Aric Sigman of the Institute of Biology. The number of hours people spend communicating face-to-face has fallen dramatically since 1987 as electronic media use has risen.

Social networking sites allow people to keep in touch with friends over the web. They can swap pictures, play games and leave messages about how their day is going. But, even though social networking sites are designed to bring people together, Dr Sigman believes they lead to people becoming more isolated from each other. Communicating face-to-face makes us happier. It is only when people are together that they release the hormone oxytocin, 'the cuddle chemical', that helps people bond together.

'One of the biggest changes in the daily habits of British people is a reduction in the time they spend interacting with each other,' said Dr Sigman. 'This has gone down from about six hours in 1987 to about two to three hours in 2007. At the same time, people are spending almost eight hours using electronic media compared with four hours 20 years earlier.'

Social networking is the internet's biggest growth area, particularly among young children. 25% of British children have a computer in their room by the age of five and use social networking sites. Research shows that they spend more time in front of a screen than doing anything else, including talking to their parents.

Dr Sigman comments: 'People think that social networking sites enrich our social lives, but they don't. It's not that I'm against new technology, but its purpose should be to make our lives better. At the moment, UK social networking use is the highest in Europe and parents spend less time with their children than they did ten years ago. Apart from anything else, the use of electronic media undermines the ability of children and young people to learn vital social skills and read body language. This could have serious implications in the future.'

Keeping in touch

Social networking sites enable you to chat with your friends or communicate with other users who have the same interests as you. They let you create your own blog, upload photos and videos for others to see and add people to an online friends list.

Social networking sites are a great way to keep in touch but you need to make sure you enjoy socialising online without getting into difficulties.

- **Be careful about what confidential information you give out.** It's common sense to reveal as little contact information about yourself as possible. Don't share the name of the place you work at, your school or even your favourite cafe on your page. It's fine to tell trusted friends how to find your profile but keep your date of birth, address and other identifying information off your page.
- **Your page is a public space, so think carefully about what you put on it.** Here's a good tip: if you'd be embarrassed for your parents, teacher or boss to see it, it probably doesn't belong on your page!
- **Think whether you know someone well enough before accepting them into your group of friends.** You don't have to accept every single request. Make sure you really do know the person who wants to be your friend.
- **Treat other people with the same respect that you would at school, college or work.** Avoid teasing, bullying or picking on others. Report any abuse or bullying you come across straightaway.

Taking quizzes, writing comments and posting videos on your site or your friends' sites is a lot of fun, but it can easily take up an entire afternoon. Set aside a specific amount of time to check your messages, write some comments and maybe play a game or two and then get back to the real world!
