	Exemplar response: Within a partnership the partners have unlimited liability, meaning they are responsible for all the debts of the business (L1). This is the same if it was a sole trader (L1). A private limited company would have limited liability, so this would be an advantage for Gorse Hill Farm as each family's debts would be limited to the amount they had invested (L2). If only one of the brothers had wanted to own the farm, then he could have been a sole trader but if there is more than one owner as in this example, then it could not have been a sole trader (L2). If the brothers wanted to keep their accounts secret, then a partnership would be a better idea as with a private limited company the public can have access to your accounts (L3). The brothers might not need a large amount of money as they are already set up so they do not need lots of shareholders (L3). I think that setting up as a partnership was the best idea because it kept the business in the family and it was not complicated to set up as a private limited company would have been (L3). 			Businesses which do not behave in an ethical manner cannot expect to have a strong customer base (L1) as people today are very aware of issues such as the effect on the environment of producing goods, child labour, etc (L1). The Body Shop has a number of ethical policies, and values. If the Body Shop does not follow these values and policies it risks losing customers (L2) as it would no longer have a good reputation (L2)and consequently business' profits would reduce (L3) because the business, at the moment, is seen to be environmentally friendly and unwilling to test on animals. This could also lead to cash flow problems (L2) and the business may no longer be able to pay its bills (L2). The Body Shop may then have to close some or all of its shops (L3), making staff redundant (L3) and eventually it may have to cease trading (L3).	[10]
