Assessment objectives

The assessment objectives are designed to reflect the non-statutory guidelines for the Art and Design Suite.

Learners are expected to demonstrate the following in the context of the content described:

- Develop their ideas through investigations informed by contextual and other sources, demonstrating analytical and cultural understanding.
- Refine their ideas through experimenting and selecting appropriate resources, media, materials, techniques and processes.
- Record ideas, observations and insights relevant to their intentions in visual and/or other forms.
- Present a personal, informed and meaningful response demonstrating analytical and critical understanding, realising intentions and, where appropriate, making connections between visual, written, oral or other elements.



While we've made some important changes and improved our GCS-Es, we haven't changed everything. Here you can see which aspects of GCSE Art and Design are changing, and which will stay the same.

Structure	 All Art and Design GCSEs will be unitised. Art and Design GCSEs are available as full courses only. All Art and Design GCSEs are 'two-unit' qualifications. The Applied GCSE will no longer be available as a double award; it will be available as a single award, two-unit GCSE. We've added a new endorsed GCSE, called Critical and Contextual Studies. 	 An unendorsed GCSE in Art and Design will still be available. Endorsed GCSEs will still be available for Fine Art, Graphic Communication, Photography – Lens and Light-based Media, Textile Design, and Three-dimensional Design.
Content	 Endorsement descriptors have been updated to reflect the new requirements, along with current processes, techniques and materials. 	 Learners will be required to produce personal responses to given starting points, scenarios and stimuli, or fit-for-purpose responses to applied client briefs.
Assessment	 The January series will no longer be available for the Applied GCSE. There will be new assessment objectives and marking criteria. Controlled assessment will replace coursework: Learners have approximately 45 hours (15-18 school weeks as a guide) to produce a portfolio of work in response to centre-devised assessment material. The work learners produce must follow controlled assessment requirements. Learners will have unlimited preparation time for the OCR-set Task unit. There will be an early release question paper for the OCR-set Task unit, with both text-based and visual starting points. 	 There will be one entry opportunity per year, as part of the June series. Learners' work is assessed and standardised internally, before external moderation by OCR. Learners have ten hours of supervised controlled time to produce their final outcomes for the OCR-set Task unit. The moderation process will be the same, and we'll give feedback on the outcome of external moderation. 'Three bites of the cherry' moderation process. You'll be able to have second or third-opinion moderation visits, within the moderation window.



What are the benefits of controlled assessment?

The benefits of controlled assessment include:

- · More straightforward marking
- Improved reliability and validity
- Varying levels of control you will know at the start of the course what is required to help you manage the assessments and your time more easily
- Greater confidence in authenticating learners' work as their own
- Greater ease in fitting assessments into your normal teaching programmes.

How will controlled assessment be introduced?

Controlled Assessment is embedded in the specification and will be introduced when the specification becomes available for teaching in September 2009.

How will it affect my workload?

With the introduction of a new qualification and a new model of assessment (controlled assessment) it is possible that some additional work will be required in the first year of teaching controlled assessment until you get used to the new way of working.

Will it affect timetabling and curriculum planning?

This will vary from centre to centre. For example, if you are retaining a linear model then all you need to do is to ensure that the learners have completed the two units (full course) by the end of the course. Following a unitised approach may allow a more flexible approach to assessment.

What is controlled assessment?

Controlled assessment is coursework in a supervised environment/ classroom and will be replacing coursework from September 2009 for GCSEs. This has been introduced by QCA, to address some of the issues raised in coursework reviews, such as plagiarism.

Who will set the tasks of the controlled assessment for Art and Design Suite and will I still need to mark it?

- Task setting there is a limited level of control. We will provide exemplar starting points, briefs, scenarios and stimuli to help you devise material for live assessment.
 Material can also be based on a learner's own ideas.
- Task taking we've introduced a medium level of control on the authenticity of learners' work, your feedback to learners, and the time taken to produce work, learner collaborations, and the resources used. Full details are included in the specification.
- Task marking all controlled assessment units will be assessed internally using our marking grids and guidance, and then moderated externally by our appointed Visiting Moderator.

How long do I need to keep the controlled assessment for?

This will be governed by the Awarding Bodies Joint Council for Qualifications' (JCQ) regulations when they are published, please visit www.jcq.org.uk for more information. It is expected that learners' work will need to be kept until all possible post results services have been exhausted.

When can controlled assessment start - in Year 9. 10 or 11?

Controlled assessment can start in Year 9, 10 or 11. However it is important that you ensure the correct controlled assessment task is given. We recommend you check the full specification details for the Art and Design suite qualification you will be teaching before planning assessment schedules.

When can learners start researching for the controlled assessment and do they need to keep their notes?

The time when you pass the tasks on to your learners is for you to manage in whatever way suits you and your learners.

Learners should keep their notes to help them as preparation for controlled assessment. All preparatory work will be required for selection in preparation for assessment and moderation.

Can we submit learners for exams in any exam session now?

Yes, but you need to be aware of the 40% terminal assessment rule, which is detailed in the specification.

If learners are entered for re-sits, which marks are considered? Latest or highest? Learners can re-sit each unit once and can count the highest mark.



Flexible assessment

Assessment for the new GCSEs in Art and Design suite has been organised into units, which can be taken at the end of the course in typical linear fashion, or used to complement a more unitised approach to teaching and learning.

This means you can have the flexibility to choose the assessment approach best suited to your centre, and your learners.

Flexible assessment means:

- You have a choice of learning approach linear or unitised.
- You can now schedule assessments for times during the course when learners' understanding is at its best – giving them a better chance of success.
- Learners can re-sit a unit, rather than repeat the entire assessment.
- Learners can receive ongoing feedback, which many find motivating, as it helps them identify their own learning needs and achieve more.
- Learners find it easier to stay on track with their studies and manage their time more effectively with a unitised approach.
- There's less pressure on your learners the 'all or nothing' approach to assessment has been removed.
- Exam stress is reduced assessments are spread out, instead of grouped together in a short, intense examination period at the end of the course.
- With a similar format to A Levels and Diplomas, GCSEs will help prepare learners for the next phase of their education.

To ensure that the assessment supports the coherence of the GCSEs and there is no over-assessment, QCA has put two rules in place:

- A minimum of 40% of the assessment must take place at the end of the course.
- Only one re-sit of each assessment unit is allowed. The better result then counts towards the qualification.


