As preparation for the standardisation meeting each examiner analyses a number of candidates' scripts: alternative answers not already covered by the mark scheme are discussed at the meeting and legislated for. If, after this meeting, examiners encounter unusual answers which have not been discussed at the meeting they are required to refer these to the Principal Examiner.

It must be stressed that a mark scheme is a working document, in many cases further developed and expanded on the basis of candidates' reactions to a particular paper. Assumptions about future mark schemes on the basis of one year's document should be avoided; whilst the guiding principles of assessment remain constant, details will change, depending on the content of a particular examination paper.

Question 1	(a)	Candidate should show a design for a child's top with an appliqué design based on a toy for the back.			
		The following should be considered:			
		Appropriate fastening(s), decorative feature, sleeves, other details such as back view, pocket, clarity of labelling/communication, balanced			

design/effective use of space, proportions, appropriate for young child.

Marks awarded as follows:

Level 1:

Untidy presentation with lack of detail, top may not be most appropriate the user, weak appliqué design. 1-2 marks

Level 2:

Sound design idea with clear communication about top and end-user this may be inappropriate in places. Neat work but design idea lacks some coherence and overall composition may be weak. Back view may be omitted.

3-5 marks

Level 2/3:

Clear detailed design idea for top suitable for end user. Appliqué may lack some interest and some style details may be omitted. **6-9 marks**

Level 3:

Clear, fully detailed design idea for a top which is highly appropriate for intended end user. Well balanced appliqué design composition, and originality shown throughout. **10-12 marks**

2 marks (b) (i) Sewing fabric shapes (1m) onto a background fabric (1m) (ii) Clear details of the steps needed in making the appliqué should be given. Notes and diagrams should be included. Marks awarded as follows: Level 1: Very basic detail with few notes/diagrams to explain what is intended, explanation confused. Question 2 (a) E.g. fabric is warm to wear, soft, hardwearing, easy care, dries quickly

Marks awarded as follows:

Level 1:

Minimal detail which tends to concentrate on fibre content only. There may be incorrect information. **1-2 marks**

Level 2:

A range of properties relating to fibre and fabric, there may be a lack of accuracy and/or relevance in information. **3-4 marks**

Level 3:

Correct and appropriate information about several properties related to fibre and fabric. **5-6 marks**

Question 3 (a) E.g. Style A has mock fly, inset pockets, elasticated back waist, turn-ups

Style B is plainer with knee patches, back patch pockets, elasticated waist, back yoke

Marks awarded as follows:

Level 1:

Candidate describes styles in minimal detail. There is little consideration of their suitability for end use. **1-3 marks**

Level 2/3:

Candidate makes effective comparisons of styles and makes good evaluation of their suitability. **4-6 marks**

(b) Candidate is expected to evaluate the performance of the two fabrics over a period of time. This should include reference to the properties of the two different fabrics in relation to the expected use of the trousers.

E.g. Fabric A is likely to pill although it might be stronger, Fabric B is strong but may not wear as well because it may wear quickly. Fabric A will hold its shape because of the Lycra content but Fabric B may stretch out of shape. Fabric B will be warmer in winter but fabric A will be cooler in summer.

Marks awarded as follows:

Level 1: Minimal detail which tends to concentrate on one fibre only. There may be incorrect information. 1-3 marks Level 2/3: A range of properties relating to both fibres, there may be a lack of understanding of end use. 4-6 marks 6 marks (c) Candidate may refer to cost, style features, fabric, allowance for growth or other as appropriate in relation to intended use. Reference should be made to one pair of trousers and decisions justified in relation to end use and value for money. Marks awarded as follows: Level 1: Opinionated statements with little justification to substantiate viewpoint made. Simplistic reference to costs. 1-2 marks Level 2: Candidate makes a number of points and gives a viewpoint with sound justification for it. 3-4 marks Level 3: Candidate makes a number of points and gives justification for both viewpoints. 5-6 marks 6 marks **Total 18 marks Question 4** Iron C (a) 1 mark Iron A 1 mark (b) (c) Iron A 1 mark Iron C 1 mark (d) (e) The iron can be used vertically 1 mark (f) They were dropped 1 mark

(g) Should be very reliable as professional ironers involved together with a user panel and presumably controlled conditions. Some room for error as judgements could be subjective.

Marks awarded as follows:

Level 1: Opinionated stateme

Opinionated statements with little justification. Simplistic reference to consumer magazine. **1 mark**

Level 2/3:

Candidate justifies decision with evidence from notes. Will probably be aware that there is some room for error in the testing. 2-3 marks 3 marks

(h) E.g. Iron A is expensive but has vertical steaming which would be useful for someone who irons a lot of furnishings. It has the highest quality, overall performance and safety and would be worth considering for someone who uses an iron a lot for a family iron and/or sews a lot.

E.g. Iron B scored reasonably well as the others in most categories and has a range of functions but not vertical steaming. It is of a reasonable quality for almost half the price of Iron A and would be more than adequate for family ironing. Its slightly lighter weight might be more comfortable in use when ironing a large family wash but perhaps not so good when pressing.

Marks awarded as follows:

Level 1:

Opinionated statements with little reference to potential end use/consumer groups. Will tend to give information in chart without evaluation of suitability.

1-2 marks

Level 2/3:

Candidate makes a number of references to end use and justifies them in light of information given. Evaluation of potential use is sound and sensible comparisons made.

3-4 marks

- (i) BSI assurance (1m) of electrical safety (1m), irons are tested to ensure safety in use (1m)

- (j) If item faulty consumer is legally (1m) entitled to refund (1m) or repair (1m) or exchange (1m)

- (k) E.g. electrical safety, don't leave switched on when not in use, iron is very hot so care needed to avoid burns, steady ironing surface, switch off before filling with water, keep away from children and pets, allow to cool before storing, care with flex to avoid tripping, adequate lighting, first aid kit available.

Marks awarded as follows: Level 1: Basic explanation of safety tending to concentrate on one aspect, few examples given. 1-2 marks Level 2: Sound advice relating to a number of areas with limited examples. 3-5 marks

Level 3:Detailed advice supported by a range of appropriate examples.6-7 marks
