The UK and the European Union

The UK joined what is now the European Union in 1973. A referendum was held in 1975 regarding new terms which the Government of the day had negotiated. A majority of those who voted supported staying in under the re-negotiated terms. Over the years, member states have agreed to transfer more powers and responsibilities to the various bodies that make up the European Union. In the late 1970s, it was agreed that the people of Europe would directly elect MEPs. Most of the officials who draft the proposals for action within the EU are nominated by the member states.


