

A Day in the Life of a Citizen of North Korea

Many North Koreans start the working day with a 30 minute session reading daily editorials in party newspapers. For children, school usually starts with marching on the spot and saluting the image of the country's leader.

Hairdressers are run by local committees. With women, untied hair is frowned upon. Long hair on men can lead to a forced haircut.

Only a few people have cars. However, owners of dirty cars can be fined. All vehicles leaving the capital city require a travel certificate. Smoking while driving is banned.

Citizens must report purchases of radios and TVs. Sets must only be tuned to state programmes. Foreign books, magazines and newspapers are forbidden.

Elections should be held on special 'Democracy Day', say MPs

Turnout at UK general elections have fallen from 79% in 1974 to 66% in 2015.

MPs have warned that this is a 'crisis of voter apathy' which will harm our democracy if we do not take urgent action.

Various radical ideas to help boost turnout have been suggested including having a 'Democracy Day' public holiday every five years on the day of the General Election.

Almost 85% of people turned out for the referendum on Scottish independence, which shows that the people will turn out if they believe they can make a difference.
