### **Source A: Refugees Welcome**



'Refugees Welcome' is a not-for-profit project that was set up in 2014 in Germany. It encourages individuals and families to invite refugees to share their homes.

'Refugees Welcome' runs a website that raises awareness of this voluntary scheme and informs people about how to join. The project's organisers also volunteer to share their own homes with refugees.

'Refugees Welcome' also works globally with international organisations to match refugees with suitable homes. The project tries to persuade people

to give money by using the internet. The money helps refugees placed in shared homes to find a job and a home of their own.

#### Source B: A Level Music student forces exam board to include women



A teenage student has succeeded in her campaign to include music written by women composers in an A Level Music course.

17-year-old Jessy McCabe began a petition on change.org after realising that none of the 63 pieces of music available to study were written by women.

More than 3000 people signed her petition and she won the backing of academics and musicians.

Jessy will now turn her attention to helping the exam board make a list of women composers suitable for the course.

### **Source C: Language and identity**



According to a 2014 survey there are more than 1 million UK children who are bilingual. This means that they speak a second language other than English with their families.

Language is a big part of cultural identity. Some parents believe that they must pass on their cultural identity while giving children the freedom to discover their own identity. Some parents hire tutors or send their children to classes to learn the family language. However, other parents decide that their children will only speak English.

Mimi Eskinder comes from Ethiopia. Mimi now regrets not teaching her Ethiopian language to her daughter Mary. When Mary visited Ethiopia, she realised that learning her parents' language was a gateway into her family's culture.

### **Source D: Saudi Women Register to Vote**



In 2015 women registered to vote in elections for the first time in the history of Saudi Arabia.

Women's rights are usually severely limited but women are now allowed to vote and stand for election themselves.

Activists have praised this – but say there is still a long way to go before women have equal rights.

Amnesty International UK said: "Let's not forget that Saudi Arabian women are still completely banned from driving. They won't actually be able to drive themselves to the polling station. They are also still unable to travel, engage in paid work or higher education, or marry without the permission of a male guardian."

### Source E: Twitter's workforce



Fewer than 2% of Twitter's employees in the USA are Black. This is just 49 people out of 3000 employees.

Only 68 employees are Hispanic and 3 are Native Americans.

Over 90% of Twitter's workforce are White or Asian.

Twitter's users in the USA are 27% Black, 25% Hispanic and 21% White.

Facebook and Google have also been criticised for employing very small numbers of Black people.
