### Study the following sources and answer the questions in the question paper.

### **Source A: Saudi Women Register to Vote**



In 2015 women registered to vote in elections for the first time in the history of Saudi Arabia.

Women's rights are usually severely limited but women are now allowed to vote and stand for election themselves.

Activists have praised this – but say there is still a long way to go before women have equal rights.

Amnesty International UK said: "Let's not forget that Saudi Arabian women are still completely banned from driving. They won't actually be able to drive themselves to the polling station. They are also still unable to travel, engage in paid work or higher education, or marry without the permission of a male guardian."

### **Source B: The National Living Wage**



The National Living Wage was announced by Chancellor of the Exchequer George Osborne in his July Budget in 2015. It sets a new legal minimum wage of £7.20 an hour for workers aged 25 and over. This scheme will start in April 2016.

The government say that this will increase wages for over two million of the lowest paid workers in Britain. However, some businesses fear that paying the new National Living Wage will cost them too much money.

Some trade unions believe that the National Living Wage may lead to more unemployment for older workers. Trade unions also claim that some businesses will want to employ younger workers who do not have to be paid the National Living Wage.

### Source C: The UK economy and global issues



Sometimes, the UK's economy is affected by events elsewhere in the world.

In 2015 the UK was told it could face a £1billion bill to help save Greece's struggling economy. The UK must help Greece because both countries are members of the European Union (EU). Other EU countries would also have to help Greece.

The UK government also gives money to developing countries through international aid spending. International aid in 2015 aimed to promote global prosperity and tackle extreme poverty. This would meet the UK's moral obligations and support our national interest.

#### Source D: The UK media in the 2015 General Election

The UK election in 2015 may be remembered more for how the media reported it than for the actual result. There were claims that newspapers reported events in a very unbalanced way.

During the campaign, an independent organisation called Election Unspun studied the press to analyse the reporting on each political party.

Here are their conclusions:

- The press didn't reflect the views of their readers or the voters. For months, opinion polls said the Conservative and Labour Parties were quite equal with about a third of the vote each.
- There was no balance in the newspaper coverage. They were constantly hostile to the Labour Party leader. The national newspapers supported the Conservative Party leader by a ratio of 5 to 1.

The manager of Election Unspun said "I've worked with aggressive media before, but nothing as biased as this."

### **Source E: The 2015 General Election**

The graph below shows both the share of votes and the share of seats that political parties gained in the 2015 General Election.
