





Section A: Homer				
Question Number	Answer			
8	How does Homer make this picture of Apollo a frightening one?  Homer emphasises the power of Apollo as he strides down from Olympus, dark and angry, his arrows rattling in a threatening manner. The ease with which he picks off first dogs and then men is detached and chilling. The sheer number of dead leaves us in no doubt as to the vulnerability of man in the face of divine wrath.  Emphasis on anger: χωόμενος κῆρ and χωομένοιο (lines 2 and 4).  Carrying weapons: τόξ' ὤμοιστν ἔχων ἀμφηρεφέα τε φαρέτρην – quiver and arrows (line 3). Iconic picture of Apollo.  Ominous rattle of arrows: ἔκλαγξαν in emphatic position, onomatopoeic and spondaic. Lines 4-5 run on, followed by pause, then short, chilling sentence: ὂ δ' ἤτε νυκτὶ ἐοικώς – simile of Apollo being like the night.  Apollo's almost casual detachment: sits down at a distance and fires: ἔζετ' ἔπειτ' ἀπάνευθε νεῶν. The god's power is effortless.  δεινὴ δὲ κλαγγή: emphatic word order with adjective first. Spondaic for emphasis and onomatopoeic.  Ease with which he picks off first mules, then dogs and finally men.  οὐρῆας μὲν πρῶτον ἐπώχετο καὶ κύνας ἀργούς,  αὐτὰρ ἔπειτ' αὐτοῖσι βέλος ἐχεπευκὲς ἐφιείς  βάλλ': clever build-up from 'mules first he went for and swift dogs, but then on the men themselves the stinging arrow he let fly – and struck!' Sentence structure reflects the action, with βάλλ held over until the beginning of the line, where it reverberates, accentuated by the pause.  αἰεὶθαμεταί: words 'always' and 'thick' frame the final sentence, emphasising the sheer numbers of dead bodies being burned.  The points given above are indicative and offer question specific guidance. Any other acceptable points must be rewarded. Answers must be marked using the level descriptors in the 10-mark marking grid at the end of the mark scheme, taking into account QWC when placing the answer within the band.	[10]

Any <b>two</b> points: one mark for reference to the Greek, one for appropriate comment.	[4]
