1. Look again at *Death in Leamington* (page 8) and *Dulce et Decorum Est* (page 13).

How does each writer describe death and the way people react to it?

For each poem you should comment on:

- the way in which the person who dies is described
- the reactions of the person or people present
- the use of language.

Support your answer with examples from the texts.

2. Look again at *The House* (page 6) and **ONE** other poem from *In Such a Time as This* in which a person remembers places or events from the past.

What do we learn of each person's thoughts and feelings about the past?

For each poem you should comment on:

- the kind of memories the person has
- how the person feels about the places or events remembered
- the use of language.

Support your answer with examples from the texts.

3. Look again at *Not My Best Side* (page 25) and *Still I Rise* (page 27).

How does each writer show a strong female character (the maiden in *Not My Best Side* and the speaker in *Still I Rise*)?

For each poem you should comment on:

- the way in which the woman's character is presented
- the woman's attitude to life and how this is shown
- the use of language.

Support your answer with examples from the texts.

4. Look again at *Once Upon a Time* (page 24) and **ONE** other poem from *Identity* in which changes to one or more people's lives are explored.

What does each writer show about these changes?

For each poem you should comment on:

- the change which takes place
- the feelings of the person or people involved
- the use of language.

Support your answer with examples from the texts.

5. Look again at *Thistles* (page 43) and *A Blade of Grass* (page 45).

How does each writer use a plant or plants to lead on to other ideas?

For each poem you should comment on:

- the way the plant or plants are described
- the ideas which lead on from thinking about the plant or plants
- the use of language.

Support your answer with examples from the texts.

OR

6. Look again at *Wind* (page 35) and **ONE** other poem from *Nature* in which people are worried or frightened by their surroundings.

What do we learn about the way the people were affected by events and sights?

For each poem you should comment on:

- the sights or events that worry or frighten them
- how the people react to these
- the use of language.

Support your answer with examples from the texts.
