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Fancy a Spot of Torture?

I will always remember the first time I went to Warwick Castle. I was nine and my brother was seven. We had a great time on that visit pretending that the suits of armour in the glass exhibition cases were going to come alive in the fashion of Disney's Bedknobs and Broomsticks.

Returning with my husband, Dean, and our children - Amy (seven) and Olivia (four) - however, I wondered how much they would enjoy the same experience twenty-five years on. These days children have so many attractions to tempt them, but Warwick Castle has moved with the times. Even the electronic ticket barriers made me smile, thinking how on our last visit we had simply handed our ticket to a lady on the door.

Once inside, however, the castle looked virtually how I had remembered it, with its beautifully kept gardens and its huge stone battlements towering over us. Signs pointed us to each of the major exhibitions and displays. The children, being children, immediately picked the dungeons and torture chambers as the first place to visit.

A guide dressed as a knight, complete with a very realistic sword, greeted us and at once got the children in the mood by warning Amy that the Winnie the Pooh character on her rucksack might be afraid of the dungeons. We then had to follow the tiny stone steps down into the darkness, and it was not hard to make the children realise that this was one place that visitors in medieval times would not have liked to come to! Back in the daylight, Amy found it most amusing that the stocks and the rack were used as methods of torture – until one of the guides explained that prisoners' guts used to burst open when they were stretched as far as they could go. Why is it kids always love gruesome stories?

Our next move was to the armoury and I was delighted to see there were now plenty of interactive displays for the kids, including a television and video presentation, and a series of wooden chests which asked questions and then had to be opened to find the answers. There was also a chance to hold a real medieval sword, which amazed the girls when we told them the knights would have run into battle carrying them. Olivia loved the sword and instantly asked to try on a soldier's helmet. Amy, meanwhile, was fascinated by a display of muskets and duelling pistols, which she said looked very different from the guns in today's films.

Back outside again and the Bowman of Warwick was on hand to teach us how to use a bow and arrow. Then it was into the Great Hall to see the luxurious furniture and wall hangings which made the castle a home in times gone by. The girls then spent an hour trying on medieval and Victorian costumes.

Our final visit was to the Kingmaker exhibition, where the wax models depicted life in the days when a king ruled the country and peasants worked the land. The sights, sounds and smells of the exhibition brought it all to life, and the wax figures were so real they actually gave us the creeps. When a wax horse neighed and moved its tail, I admit I jumped higher than the children!

Overall, then, 25 years may have come and gone, but Warwick Castle still has a lot to offer visitors of any age.
