











Item A

Starbucks and Amazon characterise the death of the British high street



It's time for retailers large and small to do more to protect the high street as a community asset.

Starbucks and Amazon stand at opposite ends of the great high street debate – one a multinational chain, the other a cloud-based internet retailer – but together they are squeezing out the independent businesses local communities need.

The planners of the new type of high street situated within an out of town retail park, or even a single large scale supermarket, are now using

their financial muscle to drive out independent high street shops. Council business rents are rising beyond the reach of all but the most tenacious retailers. Meanwhile faceless online stores drive down prices, destroy the concept of service and turn shopping from a social activity into a mechanical transaction.

Big businesses need to recognise the negative impact they are having on communities and ask themselves if that is a sensible way to work. They need to take action themselves. We could ask government for action, but that is a long term strategy and without rapid change our high streets will be dead and buried.

Local consumers need to wake up to what they are losing when they are shopping online: product choice, quality service, local knowledge – and the ability to surprise a loved one with a gift at Christmas because it has a personal touch. In a rapidly homogenising world, shoppers should look to independents for a point of difference.

It must be made easier for independent retailers and consumers to meet. They should also look to use the tools of big business and the internet, to create ways to reach customers better and thus survive or even expand. High streets are great places, often full of character but their shops need to compete in a more positive way to exist in today's ever changing society. The website, MyHigh.St, helps that process, reminding smaller retailers that together they are strong.

'The focus is too much on rescuing or recreating High Streets of old,' says Bill Grimsey, former boss of Iceland stores. 'It's a waste of time. They can't be saved. The reason town centres are dying is consumers don't want them. We don't shop like we used to. We have to stop harking back to the past and get on with the important task of working out what we need in the town centres of the future. While most people pay lip service to the notion of quaint town centres with a diverse range of independent shops, fewer and fewer people have supported them. They voted with their feet.'

If Grimsey's views are accurate and consumers continue to change their habits towards using shopping malls and the internet, the number of shops that may become vacant over the next five years could well reach a third of all outlets.


