**Specimen Mark Scheme** 

Mark schemes are prepared by the Principal Examiner and considered, together with the relevant questions, by a panel of subject teachers. This mark scheme includes any amendments made at the standardisation meeting attended by all examiners and is the scheme which was used by them in this examination. The standardisation meeting ensures that the mark scheme covers the candidates' responses to questions and that every examiner understands and applies it in the same correct way. As preparation for the standardisation meeting each examiner analyses a number of candidates' scripts: alternative answers not already covered by the mark scheme are discussed at the meeting and legislated for. If, after this meeting, examiners encounter unusual answers which have not been discussed at the meeting they are required to refer these to the Principal Examiner.

It must be stressed that a mark scheme is a working document, in many cases further developed and expanded on the basis of candidates' reactions to a particular paper. Assumptions about future mark schemes on the basis of one year's document should be avoided; whilst the guiding principles of assessment remain constant, details will change, depending on the content of a particular examination paper.

There will be errors in spelling, punctuation and grammar.

#### 3-6 marks

Mentions 3 or more effects on physical health with some reasoning; for 6 marks a direct link should be made between 1 effect and its cause.

Answers are organised but lack precision and there may be errors in spelling, punctuation and grammar. There may be some use of appropriate terminology.

#### 7-8 marks

Answers cover at least 5 effects on physical health in good detail and with sound reasoning; for 8 marks at least 2 direct links between cause and effect should be given. Answers are well structured, logical and demonstrate good spelling, punctuation and grammar. There is good use of appropriate terminology

Beccy's binge drinking leading to drunkenness AW (1) making Beccy vulnerable to accident/harm by others (1) as **physical** effects (1) may lead Beccy into anti-social behaviour AW (1) result in criminal activity AW (1) Beccy may become addicted to alcohol (1) may develop liver problems AW (1) such as fatty liver/cirrhosis or liver cancer (1) nerve cell damage (1) and/or high blood pressure (1) strokes (1) **max 8**

Calum's long hours in an intellectually challenging job is likely to cause stress which may cause raised blood pressure/tiredness as physical effects cause him to be irritable but may feel sense of achievement holding down a demanding job lack of exercise may cause him to gain weight may depend on how he eats increased risk of heart disease/weight-related disorders may enjoy sedentary lifestyle which contributes to emotional well-being allow physical effect mark if not previously given not changing underclothes for three or four days is poor personal hygiene may develop body odour causing social effects other workers avoid Calum also increased risk of infection allow physical mark here if not awarded previously max 10

#### 0 marks

No response worthy of credit

#### 1-3 marks

Only 1-3 points made with statements not reasoned and often vague Answers are superficial, lack structure and may be repetitive. There will be errors in spelling, punctuation and grammar.

#### 4-7 marks

Makes 3 or more points with some reasoning as to how they cause their effect; for 7 marks answer must include the identification of PES and at least 1 positive aspect. Answers are organised but lack precision and there may be errors in spelling, punctuation and grammar. There may be some use of appropriate terminology.

#### 8-10 marks

Answers cover at least 5 points in good detail with all PES identified; for 10 marks answer must include a detailed consideration of more than 1 positive aspect and 2 negative aspects.

Answers are well structured, logical and demonstrate good spelling, punctuation and grammar. There is good use of appropriate terminology

noise pollution disturbing sleep (1) causing tiredness AW (1) may cause hearing problems (1) as **physical** effects (1) and irritability AW (1) as an **emotional** effect (1) **max 5**
