After learning to fly, I joined the Air Transport Auxiliary in Buckinghamshire. I was the only woman with twenty men! It was the sort of interesting job men liked to do and not to let women in, but I was very fortunate. The war gave women like me an opportunity.

SOURCE C

It is important to remember that during the war in factories and services, men doing the same work as women were paid higher wages. Also women often found that they had two roles to fulfil – in the war effort and as housewives in their own homes. For many, they shouldered a double burden during the war.
