4		Rear facing baby seat	Group 0: for babies up to 10 kg (22 lbs) from birth to 6-9 months or Group 0+:for babies up to 13kg (29lbs) roughly from birth to 12-15 months. They can be used in the front or rear of the car. It is safer to put them in the rear. DO NOT put them in the front seat if there is a passenger airbag. Rearward-facing seats provide greater protection for the baby's head, neck and spine than forward-facing seats.		Marks are allocated according to the quality of the response. Candidates should be able to show their depth of knowledge and understanding, using correct terminology.  In order to achieve a High Level response, both areas must be addressed in detail.  A candidate answering only one part of the question well remains in the Limited Response level and can access up to 7 marks only.  Must be answered well, with clear descriptions and/or explanations. The bottom attachment between the legs will also prevent the child from sliding under, and out of, the harness. They can be used in the front or rear of the car, but it is safer to put them in the rear, especially if there is a passenger airbag in the front.			safety labels found on items that could be bought for a child. The basic points to note are: the belt should be worn as tight as possible, the lap belt should go over the pelvic region, not the stomach, the diagonal strap should rest over the shoulder, not the neck.  Up to 22kg or 6-11 years to be raised high enough to see out of window and used with an adult seat belt.
