



#### Source E: The environment

The world is full of environmental problems.

- Rainforests are under threat. One-tenth of the Brazilian rainforest has gone in the last ten years, and a quarter of the Indonesian rainforest.
- Urban smog and pollution kill over two and a half million people a year.
- Wildlife is under threat. There are nearly four thousand endangered species.
- In the UK we recycle less than one-fifth of our waste.
- The global population will grow to over 7 billion soon, and will be over 9 billion by 2050.
- Climate change is worrying, and fossilfuel emissions continue to rise.

Against this background there are groups that campaign to protect the environment. Greenpeace has tried to stop environmental damage. Greenpeace has just bought a piece of land in the middle of the proposed third runway at Heathrow Airport. Many celebrities have joined in to try to stop this development as they believe that more air travel will contribute to climate change.

Air travel is one of the human activities that increase the production of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. Many people are already taking responsibility for reducing their own 'carbon footprint'.

Greenpeace has tried to:

- stop whaling
- reduce the burning of fossil fuels
- prevent GM (genetically modified) crops from being grown
- stop the incineration of rubbish
- end nuclear power generation.

Greenpeace lobbies governments to make changes. Greenpeace is, for example, running a petition against the expansion of Heathrow Airport. It also takes direct action such as boarding whaling boats.
