

# Examiners' Report June 2016

## GCSE ICT 5IT01 01

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## Introduction

This is the eighth time that candidates have sat examinations for this unit, which requires them to explore how current and emerging digital technologies impact on the lives of individuals, organisations and society. This is an untiered paper that has been specifically designed so that easier questions are more prevalent earlier in the paper, becoming progressively more difficult later on. This paper has been designed to be accessible, so that candidates of all ability ranges will find questions that are both challenging and interesting throughout.

Candidates are introduced to a scenario, within which they can contextualise their responses. Additionally, candidates will find that 'command words' are used consistently in the paper to indicate the type of response expected. It is hoped that candidates will demonstrate the knowledge, understanding and skills required to be savvy users of ICT. Successful candidates often provided more detailed responses and, increasingly, candidates are providing more than just simple statements, including examples and reasons where expansions or explanations were required. In the extended questions, candidates demonstrated a better understanding of the requirement to analyse, evaluate, make reasoned judgements and present conclusions. Candidates should develop their use of subject specific language and should make better use of the Technology Update document, published every Spring, to clarify what technology they are expected to learn about.

### Question 1 (c)

Most candidates gained the mark for this question, usually for stating 'router'.

(c) The nursery connects a media station to a WiFi network.

Most candidates gained one of the two available marks for this question, usually for stating that there had been an increase in users of the network.

Many candidates attempted to discuss the impact on bandwidth, but in a wide range of cases candidates discussed more about sharing the 'Wi-Fi', 'internet' or 'connection' as opposed to 'data' and 'bandwidth'.

This response gained 1 mark for 'The more people connect'.

(ii) Visitors connect to the nursery's network and browse the web.

Explain why the quality of video being streamed is reduced when visitors connect.

## Question 1 (e)

Most candidates gained a mark for this question. Usually for stating 'password'. A number of candidates stated 'hide the network', but failed to relate this to 'network name' or 'SSID'.

### Question 1 (f)

Most candidates gained both marks for this question. 'Earphones', 'speakers' and 'remote' were the most frequent correct answers. The most common incorrect answers were HDMI cables/ storage devices/ tablets (as, although they can be used, they are not peripheral devices).

## Question 1 (g)

Few candidates gained a mark for this question. The majority of answers defined breach of copyright (e.g. 'stealing work from someone else') or what happens once you have breached it.

## Question 1 (h)

Just under half of all candidates gained a mark for this question, often for mentioning parental controls and filtering, where others repeated the question, with a common incorrect response being 'block' rather than stating how to block. Candidates often incorrectly suggested password protecting sites, adding age limits, firewalls or using encryption.

## Question 2 (a) (i)

Most candidates gained two marks for this question. Some candidates lost marks for stating 'phone' or 'mobile phone' instead of 'smartphone', or stating 'computer' on its own.

## Question 2 (a) (ii)

Most candidates gained both marks for this question, which required candidates to use their knowledge of the digital divide.

## Question 2 (d) (ii)

Few candidates gained marks for this question. Most responses related to security of data or ease of use. The majority of the responses were framed as benefits to parents, not the nursery (the requirement for which was made clear in the question).



Most candidates gained all three marks for this question. The most frequent incorrect responses were PIN / date of birth / email address and sort code.



## Question 2 (e) (ii)

Few candidates gained a mark for this question. Many responses related to PIN numbers or encryption and showed little understanding of what NFC is.

### Question 3 (a)

Most candidates gained one mark for the question. Candidates gained both marks when focusing on the fact that the photoblog provided a single area to upload/view/share the images linking to the fact that an email needed to be sent to individual parents and therefore took longer. A number of candidates failed to gain marks through the lack of explanation in describing 'easily' or it being 'easier' without any clarification. Some responses incorrectly referred to geotagging, the idea that other family members could see the photos or the photos not being lost/deleted.

### Question 3 (b)

Most candidates gained at least one mark for correctly identifying the fact that photoblogging could mean that others / strangers would be able to see the images of the children. Where candidates gained only one mark, they usually failed to mention sharing/ tagging etc. as part of their answer. Some candidates gained both marks by linking geotagging as the way strangers could find out the location of the children.

Most candidates gained both marks for this question. Commonly, correct responses included asking for parents' consent and blurring the faces of the children.

### Question 3 (d) (ii)

Few candidates gained marks for this question. The most common correct response related to location data being collected. This was a question that demonstrated a gap in subject knowledge. Candidates seemed to interpret the question as referring to a situation in which a financial transaction was taking/had taken place, rather than transactional data in the context of the use of cookies to record data. Typical incorrect responses discussed sales data, name, email address etc. rather than transactional data that could arise from a visit to the blog. Many candidates gave responses that would have been appropriate for question 3(d)iii.

### Question 3 (d) (iii)

Most candidates did not gain the mark for this question. Transactional data was mistaken for 'transaction' and answers mainly consisted of monetary or payment information. Those that answered the question correctly typically said that the nursery could analyse what was popular, or use the data for targeted marketing or personalisation.

### Question 3 (e)

Most candidates gained at least two marks for this question. Many candidates missed out on a mark by not acknowledging that you needed to first download the image from the blog. Most candidates recognised that Bluetooth or USB was the most appropriate method for transferring to the tablet. Candidates failed to gain marks when they described how Pete could set up a personal hotspot to share his internet connection, or related their responses to the use of Cloud computing. Some candidates failed to gain a mark by being too general in the term used for the connection - 'cable' being common.

This response gained 2 marks, for 'an image on his laptop', and 'transfer'. No mark was awarded for 'save', because it is not enough for 'Download' (and it is in the question). No mark was awarded for 'automatically', because 'Photostream' will require access to the internet to facilitate the transfer.

This response gained all 3 marks for 'download', 'the image on to his laptop' and 'send the image to Laura's tablet'. The candidate has also correctly indicated this could be done using Bluetooth.

### Question 3 (f)

Most candidates gained one mark from this question, usually for answers relating to no access to social media, online shopping or online banking. Very few candidates stated positive implications.

A number of candidates misinterpreted the question and gave causes of people not having access to the internet e.g. religion, rural location (rather than implications, as required by the question).

Many candidates answered by stating things that could be done without the internet, but would simply be more difficult. i.e. 'research things' / 'do homework'. There were lots of vague answers e.g. 'can't communicate with people abroad' and 'can't browse anything'.

## Question 4 (b)

Most candidates gained one mark from this question. Candidates often did not give linked responses. Where they did, they often linked connecting with WiFi to use VoIP. Marks were awarded for VoIP if candidates used brand names such as Skype.

Although the word 'speak' was emboldened in the question, many candidates gave answers relating to email or messaging, perhaps highlighting issues with exam technique.

(b) The smartphone cannot access the mobile phone network.

Describe how nursery staff could use the smartphone with another type of network to **speak** to a parent.

Nursery staff could connect <sup>the smartphone</sup> to a WiFi network and can speak to a parent using a VOIP service for example Skype. (2)

When a device uses/is tethered to a phone as a personal hotspot, the phone's connection to a mobile phone network is used. Therefore, this is not an acceptable response (see the stem of the question).

## Question 4 (c) (i)

Most candidates did not gain marks for this question, often because they related to having access from anywhere in the world or simply commented upon it being a resource for finding things out. Many candidates commented incorrectly that the world wide web is a search engine. There were lots of responses that used everyday language to describe what the internet and world wide web did. A lot of candidates talked about making 'a connection' to the web, rather than the web being 'connected' sites.

There seemed to be confusion between this question and Q4(c)ii, showing a definite lack of understanding of the difference between the world wide web and the internet.

### Question 4 (c) (ii)

Most candidates did not gain the mark for this question. Many responses were general e.g. 'It's where you search things up', 'It's another name for the web'.

Again, there seemed to be confusion between this question and Q4c(i), showing a definite lack of understanding of the difference between the world wide web and the internet.

Most candidates gained the mark for this question, usually for answers relating to the screen or storage. Common incorrect answers were 'processor', '3G' / '4G' or 'speed'.

## Question 4 (f)

Most candidates gained one mark for this question. Most candidates knew what wearable computers were and many gave brand names. Most candidates knew they monitored things such as heart rate or steps taken. Some candidates identified that the devices are connected with some identifying how this connection was made. Some candidates incorrectly referred to connecting to and downloading from PC's. A number of responses incorrectly focussed on RSI and eyesight problems of the users.

(f) Smartphones can be used with wearable computers.

Describe **one** way that smartphones can be used with wearable computers to monitor the health and fitness of individuals.

Smart phones are now able to be connected to fitness devices such as 'fitbits' by sending the information of the wearable computers to the phone over bluetooth or connecting in order to send health and fitness information such as the amount of exercise or heart rate of the person so it can then be monitored for data in order for them to check their health and fitness easily.

## Question 4 (g)

Most candidates gained four marks for this question. Many candidates were able to discuss the impact of digital devices on the environment and presented their arguments in a well organised, planned and justified manner. Most responses discussed less use of paper, less need to travel and CO2 emissions, pollution, recycling, global warming, electricity (or energy) and landfills giving both advantages and disadvantages. Some candidates over-emphasised the use of digital devices without referring to the environment, particularly using digital devices for socialising, texting, using social media, depleting social skills, impact on lifestyle and living environment, not outdoor environment. Some candidates failed to comment upon the environment, simply discussing the advantages / disadvantages of digital devices. A significant minority of candidates incorrectly discussed the harmful effects of radiation produced by devices and some confused environment with personal health.

There are many positive and negative impacts on the environment due to the use of digital devices. One positive impact is less resources are needed when communicating over the Internet. For example, you don't need to write a letter (paper) to deliver a message, instead you can call or write an email. This also saves a lot more time, because people don't have to wait to receive a letter. Another positive is that, you have less pollution, <sup>because</sup> ~~due to~~ people don't have to drive to deliver post, which increases how much CO<sub>2</sub> is going into air. However, the constant increase in the use of digital devices increases the amount of <sup>electricity</sup> ~~power~~ used, therefore increasing burning of fossil fuel. This is a negative, because the burning of fossil fuels increase the rate of the greenhouse effect. Also, trees and other habitats of animals are being destroyed, ~~to~~ because companies are building factories to increase the produce of digital devices. This can lead to the extinction of some species, who may

not be able to adapt to new environments. Overall, the digital devices have a positive and negative <sup>impact</sup> ~~use~~ on the environment, as it can lead to the ~~one~~ decreased use of one resource, but the increased in another.

Positive points included 'less resources...' [POINT] 'you don't need to write a letter (paper) to deliver a message...' [EXAMPLE] 'instead you can call or write an email' [REASON].

The part of the response about saving time does not reduce marks. We do not do this. We use a positive marking approach.

'less pollution' [POINT] 'because people don't have to drive to deliver post' [REASON] 'which increases how much CO<sub>2</sub> is going into air' [EXAMPLE]

Negative points included 'increase in use of devices increases electricity used' [POINT] 'therefore increasing burning of fossil fuel' [EXAMPLE] 'increase the rate of the greenhouse effect' [REASON].

(Note use of 'However' as a way of connecting the response together).

'Also trees and other habitats of animals are being destroyed' [POINT] 'because companies are building factories to increase the produce of digital devices' [plausible REASON] 'Lead to extinction of some species...' [plausible EXAMPLE].

The conclusion at the end is not necessary for a balanced discussion (which has been achieved) and is often used by candidates to summarise their points. In this case, it can be ignored.

This response clearly meets the descriptors for level 3, so the mark is provisionally set at the top of mark band 3, with 6 marks.

As the mark is provisionally set at the top of a mark band, Quality of Written Communication (QWC) must be considered. The QWC does not meet the descriptor for Level 3 as it contains numerous spelling and grammar errors. The mark must be reduced by 1. Marks are only ever reduced for responses to the two extended writing questions and only if the QWC does not meet the descriptor for the level at which the response was provisionally placed and only if the provisional mark is at the top of a mark band.

A final mark of 5 has been awarded.

The use of smartphones and other digital devices has had some positive impacts on the environment. Because of using them, people can access data, forms and documents online, or just on their devices, and less paper is being used for printing, books and forms. Also, because people can order clothes and food, and can work from home via their digital devices, people have to travel less, creating less CO<sub>2</sub> emissions from their cars.

However, the use of smartphones and other digital devices has also had some negative impacts. Although less paper is being used, far more renewable resources are being used. For example, because the cases and components are made of plastic and metal, our use of crude oil has increased. Along with this, because despite people traveling less, CO<sub>2</sub> emissions have increased because of the energy that is required to make the digital devices, and the fuel we use when bringing them in from other countries by plane. Also, because of the use of digital devices, many countries now have a more throwaway society, and the amount of packaging that is thrown away with digital devices is huge.

Overall, I think digital devices have had more negative environmental impacts because of how many are made each year.

## Question 5 (d)

Most candidates gained all three marks for this question. Candidates obviously knew the steps required to reset a password and could correctly recall them. Some candidates incorrectly provided responses on what they would have to do if they had forgotten their password to the local network. Some candidates did not gain marks because they described how to create strong password.

Many candidates failed to elaborate on those points as to why or give a consequence, or link it to the nursery. A number of responses were concerned about images of children being uploaded onto the social networking site and security issues with geotagging. Many responses mentioned location being tracked - and the risk of stalking, with many candidates making reference to viruses/hacking.

## Question 5 (f)

Most candidates gained three marks for this question, with many candidates demonstrating an understanding of the implications of the widespread use of the internet on the availability, accuracy and control of online information about an individual. Some candidates discussed digital footprints and how something posted years ago can impact on individuals' lives. In the majority of cases, candidates were able to discuss how comments on social media etc. could impact on job opportunities and be taken out of context. Few candidates wrote about the positive of being able to promote yourself through the internet. Where candidates were less successful, they tended to be too general and discuss cyber-bullying, access to criminal records etc. and not link it to job opportunities. Many candidates mentioned the Data Protection Act, but incorrectly linked it to privacy.

On one hand, widespread use of the internet with regards to an individual may mean employers can assess who is more suitable for a position based on online behaviour - which could prevent people accessing a job for which their behaviour is not appropriate for - this could be found on social media websites or through a search of the person. However, ~~this information is unlikely to~~ This availability of information means people can be researched rather than taken at face value. However, this may be unfair - as it blurs the line between work and leisure, and prevents people from separating work and social lives. The accuracy of information may also be suspect, as viewers have no guarantee the source is reliable. This means people may be penalised for actions that didn't happen or have no place in discussion offline.

Overall, the widespread use of the internet and access to information means that people need to control what is available to be viewed by who, and puts pressure on people to control their online activity - which isn't necessarily a bad thing, as it will reduce negative speech.

This response gains 5 marks. It links all three points to consider impact. Availability ('people can be researched rather than taken at face value') links to impact 'unfair as blurs line between work and leisure'. Accuracy ('no guarantee the source is reliable' is linked to 'people may be penalised for actions that didn't happen'). Control ('people need to control what is available to be viewed'). This certainly meets the descriptor for a Level 2 response and, although it does not clearly link into the widespread use of the internet, when looked at holistically, the discussion of the 3 areas above places it in the top mark band. 5 marks awarded provisionally. As the mark is at the bottom of a mark band, QWC must not be considered. A final mark of 5 has been awarded. (The QWC would have met the descriptor for Level 3 if permitted).

The nursery manager searches online for information about people who apply and finds a comment on a blog that worries her.

Discuss the impact of the widespread use of the internet on the availability, accuracy and control of online information about an individual.

Limiting the information one has access to ~~on~~ about an individual is extremely hard to do. Due to the massive number of people present on the internet, if a inappropriate or private piece of information is leaked, it can be rapidly shared and not be contained, leading to impacts on an individual's work life, or ability to get a job. Hackers are also present on the internet users who are very difficult to track down due to the internet's large user base and can decrypt previously encrypted information such as emails or bank account details. Another issue is the widespread use of GPS devices within personal devices allowing internet users to see a location of another through sites such as Facebook, which use social networking. Information present on the internet is often quite difficult to detect whether it's accurate or not, as the information put onto the internet is generally anonymous, meaning that users often say or do unacceptable/illegal things which could be placed on another individual, causing stress and psychological damage.



This response gains 5 marks. Remember - the context of the question is not required to gain marks. It includes all three points and highlights impacts relevant to the widespread use of the internet. Availability and control ('due to the massive number of people... leaked information can be rapidly shared and not be contained') impact is then considered ('leading to impact on an individual's work life or ability to get a job'). 'Large user base' is then linked to the difficulty in tracking hackers who can decrypt emails or bank details (control). Although GPS does not use the internet, the devices often do - to provide the maps upon which the GPS location is positioned for the user. Therefore, the section related to how users can see each others' location through social networking is valid and related to availability of information and its control (privacy). Accuracy (or reliability in this case) is considered 'information is generally anonymous' and is linked to the impact - 'causes stress...'. This certainly meets the descriptor for a Level 3 response. 6 marks awarded provisionally. As the mark is at the top of a mark band, QWC must be considered. The QWC does not meet the descriptor for Level 3, due to a number of grammatical errors. A final mark of 5 has been awarded.

## Paper Summary

Based on their performance on this paper, candidates are offered the following advice:

- Continue to develop the good practice of expanding and explaining answers using examples and reasons, where more than a simple statement or list is required.
- Respond with the context of the question in mind.
- Do not repeat responses when more than one example/reason is required.
- Identify key words and command words in the question to ensure responses reflect what the question asks.
- Practise a range of extended questions, not just balanced arguments.
- Allocate time to plan the two six-mark extended questions.
