For the most part the information will be relevant and presented in a structured and coherent format. Specialist terms will be used appropriately and for the most part correctly.		
	Level 1 (0-3 marks)		
	Candidates may only address some aspects of the question, and give basic descriptions of advantage(s) and/or disadvantage(s) of connecting home computers in a network. Answers may be in the form of a list. There will be little or no use of specialist terms.
