Minister urged to act on festival no-show

Article A:

Taken from a compact/broadsheet newspaper.

The Culture Minister has been urged to impose stricter controls on concert organisers after singer Dave Cooper failed to show at an outdoor festival.

With a string of number one hits, Cooper regularly plays to sell-out gigs all over Europe.

But there were angry scenes in Belfast on Saturday evening when the British rock star failed to turn up for a huge outdoor gig.

Organisers were left red-faced when the star failed to turn up, despite having earlier carried out sound checks at the venue. The singer and members of his band were seen in a bar in Dublin city centre late on Saturday night.

Angry fans, many of whom paid up to £50 for tickets, chanted "shame, shame" when promoter, Joe Mackle of Mackle Music Productions told them the concert had been postponed due to "unforeseen circumstances."

Police were called to the venue when fans stormed ticket offices demanding their money back.

Eyewitness Joe Smith said: "Things turned very ugly when frustrated fans demanded refunds. Some started to kick the doors of the ticket offices but police quickly restored order."

A spokeswoman for Mackle Music Productions said yesterday Cooper claimed he had fallen sick and had no way of contacting the promoter.

She said: "Mackle Music Productions is currently looking at ways of refunding ticket prices."

Furious fans have condemned the singer's no-show. There have also been calls for greater controls to be enforced in the music industry.

Sam Morgan of the "Keep Music Live" group said it was intolerable that fans should be treated in such a way.

Cooper could not be contacted at the time of going to press.

Rock fans storm ticket office

Article B:

Taken from a red top tabloid newspaper

Angry rock fans stormed a hicket office following a no-show at a Belfast gig by rocker Dave Cooper.

Thousands of rock fans attending the Summer Nights concert chanted "shame, shame" when promoters announced the outdoor concert was being cancelled at short notice.

Cooper, who earlier turned up for a sound check, went AWOL just before he was scheduled to take the stage for Saturday's performance.

One of the UK's top rockers, Cooper draws legions of fans wherever he plays. Last night gig promoters Mackle Music Productions denied claims Cooper was seen with band members in a Dublin bar at the time he was meant to go on stage.

In Hiding

The rock star was in hiding last night as fans demanded an explanation for the no-show.

Cops were called to the Belfast venue when fans – some of whom paid up to £50 for tickets – tried to force their way into a ticket office.

Shocked concert goer, Joe Smith said: "Some started to kick in the doors of the ticket office."

A Mackle Music Productions spokeswoman said the star became suddenly sick with an undisclosed illness on Saturday.

The spokeswoman said: "Mackle Music Productions is currently looking at ways of refunding ticket prices."
