
Jane Coulter, his girlfriend, in a telephone interview said: "I am very proud of Colm and he deserves to win the title."

Mother's appeal as firework wrecks career

Article A

A broadsheet/compact newspaper.

A mother has appealed to parents to be careful after a firework ended her talented son's career as a pianist.

Simon Jefferson (16), who completed grade eight piano at the age of 12, had three fingers blown off when a faulty firework exploded in his hand.

The young Belfast lad was playing with friends on Hallowe'en night when the tragedy occurred.

His mother, Laura, said the accident means her son will now never achieve his dream of becoming a concert pianist.

"Simon and his friends, Rory and Josh, were lighting rockets outside the house when one of them didn't go off.

"We had warned him of the dangers but he still lifted the rocket and it exploded in his hand," Mrs Jefferson said.

The Belfast woman said: "When we got Simon to the hospital the doctors tried to re-attach the three fingers on his right hand but weren't able to. We're devastated."

She said: "My son always dreamt of a career in music. He used to practise for hours every day but now that dream is over."

Simon's music teacher, Arnold Goldstein, said the accident was difficult to accept.

"Simon's talent is something that you come across once in a generation; it is just so wrong that this talent has been lost," he said.

A PSNI spokeswoman urged parents to ensure that rockets were only purchased from reputable suppliers.

She said: "Parents should always supervise the use of fireworks and no firework should be approached once lit."

The spokeswoman said police were investigating the incident in which Simon lost his fingers. She said early indications were that the rockets were purchased from an unlicensed dealer

Faulty firework shatters teenage dream

A red top tabloid newspaper.

Police are cracking down on illegal firework sellers after a piano genius lost half his hand when a dodgy rocket exploded.

Teen prodigy Simon Jefferson (16) will now never fulfil his childhood ambition of becoming a concert pianist. The Belfast teenager lost three fingers on his right hand in the accident.

His heartbroken mum, Laura, said Simon dreamt of becoming a classical music star ever since he obtained his piano grade eight at just 12 years of age.

Simon lifted the rocket on Hallowe'en night when it failed to go off but it exploded in his hand ripping three fingers off.

Brave doctors worked to save the hand but were unable to re-attach the fingers.

According to shocked mum, Laura: "We're devastated."

Music maestro, Arnold Goldstein, said Simon had a unique talent.

"It is just so wrong that this talent has been lost," he said.

Now police say the rocket was bought from an unlicensed seller. A PSNI spokeswoman vowed to catch the rogue sellers who have shattered Simon's dreams.
