 - (iii) pick out **one Latin** word which shows how serious Pliny thought the eruption was. [1]
- (d) iam navibus ... pete (lines 7–12): in these lines how does Pliny make his account interesting for the reader? Make **four** points. [4]

 - (i) what **two** buildings is Pliny going to construct? [2]
 - (ii) how will the goddess benefit? [1]
 - (iii) how will it help the people? [1]
- (g) velim ... excolantur (lines 9-11): what instructions does Pliny give his architect in these lines? [4]
