1	Men/humans (1) did not give/ were giving no (1) gifts (1) to the gods (1).	[4]	Accept 'men were not/never giving any gifts', i.e. any negative will do for <i>nulla</i> . Accept 'had <u>been</u> giving', but not 'had given'. Accept 'would not give'. Accept 'the men'.
2	To see (1) what (1) they were/are doing/did (1).	[3]	Ignore insertion/mistranslation of <i>ipse</i> . facerent - do not accept 'make', but if facerent is wrong, accept 'why' for quid, e.g. 'why this was happening'. Do not accept 'have done'.
3	So that he would/could/might/may not be recognised. Lest he be/was/might be/may be recognised.	[1]	The purpose idea must be expressed, i.e. do not accept 'so that he was not recognised'. Accept 'So that no one might recognise him/he did not want to be recognised.'
4	He had heard/ heard (1) that he was/is (1) very cruel (1).	[3]	'He heard how very cruel he was' – 2 marks 'very cruel' must be singular; do not allow 'very cruel things'.

Section	The passage has been divided into 5 sections, worth 4 marks each. Award up to four marks per translated section according to the following 4-mark marking grid. 4 Correct translation, with one minor error allowed. 3 Overall sense clear, with one major AND one minor error or three minor errors allowed. 2 Part correct, but with overall sense lacking/unclear (See * below.) 1 No continuous sense correct; isolated knowledge of vocabulary only. (See * below.) 0 Totally incorrect or omitted. * In order to gain 2 marks, at least three unglossed words (excluding et) and the structure must be correct. * In order to gain 1 mark, the meaning of at least three unglossed words (excluding et). There is no need for the structure to be clear.	Marks	Major errors: any omitted word. Unless there is a special ruling, any error of tense, case or person etc. is a major error. Incorrect number will sometimes be regarded as a minor error (a ruling will be given when this happens). Minor errors 1. Misspelling of names/failure to reproduce proper nouns in the nominative case – treat as minor error once only per name. 2. Incorrect rendering of past tense, e.g. Perfect for Imperfect or vice-versa. Special rulings will be given on the Pluperfect. Transposition of Active to Passive or vice-versa 1. If the correct agent/subject is expressed, accept. 2. If the omitted agent is a pronoun, treat as a minor error on each occasion (not a repeated error). Put a wavy line under the verb, not an omission mark. Underline serious errors with a straight line, minor errors with a wavy line. If the section is completely wrong, or part of it cannot be analysed word by word, put a continuous line under the whole section or part. Omissions should be marked with a caret ^. Put 'REP' above consequential or repeated errors, which should not be penalised. Special Ruling – if the following words are mistranslated, treat as
			minor error: If omitted, or rendered as another part of speech, a major error: igitur, tamen, iam, tum, deinde.

If the derivative is incorrect, but the meaning of the derivative is correct, award one mark. If the meaning of the derivative is a different part of speech, award one mark for the derivative, if correct, but not its meaning e.g. 'donation' – 'to give money'. Accept 'dormouse/dormobile/dormie/dorm'.

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
