SOURCE A

Social inequality means people from ethnic minority groups may not have the same opportunities as others in society. They may be stereotyped and face discrimination. They may feel the government does not do enough to support them and that they are treated unfairly. They may find it more difficult to find accommodation or employment.

By engaging with others from ethnic minority groups people can learn why it is important to address inequalities and recognise the valuable contribution they make to society. They enrich our culture by sharing theirs through music, dance, and language. They offer new talents and skills to employers and create business opportunities.

Citizens can help to address issues around social inequality through active participation. They can influence change by lobbying government, participating in peaceful marches/protests or by supporting a political party and voting. However, some people may not want to get involved or think there is no need to take action and leave it to others.
