Level 3 - If more people can walk through the farmers fields then it will erode the land and if the weather is bad the land will be muddy and take a long time to recover so plants may be lost and die. Tourists will talk as they walk which will disturb the wildlife so some birds might move away from the area and become rare. The positive impact of having local events will mean that the community will be involved and it will bring back local traditions and there will be jobs created to organise the events. The events themselves might sell local produce so this means local people can sell food which means that they make money so that there is more money made from the sales of eggs, cheese etc. (7).
