
Volume of a prism = area of cross section \times length




Volume of sphere = $\frac{4}{3} \pi r^3$ Surface area of sphere = $4\pi r^2$




Volume of cone = $\frac{1}{3}\pi r^2 h$

Area of triangle = $\frac{1}{2}ab \sin C$
















