The Mass

The Mass was once said in Latin with the last phrase 'Ite missa est' meaning 'Go you are sent' / at the end of the service (Mass) the congregation are sent to continue their Christian mission having been strengthened by the body and blood of Jesus in the way that they live their lives and in the way that they treat other people, especially those in need / term used by Roman Catholics and some Anglicans / for most Roman Catholics, going to Mass and receiving the bread and wine are at the centre of their lives as Christians.

Eucharist

Comes from the Greek word for 'thanksgiving' / it is the term used particularly by Roman Catholics and Anglicans / draws attention to the fact that believers give thanks for the blessings that they share through this sacrament / by sharing bread and wine Christians are giving thanks for the sacrifice Jesus made for them / he gave up his life to bring people back to God / he became the sacrificial lamb / name used for the central prayer that includes the consecration of the bread and wine.

Maximum Level 4 if only one title explained.

Candidates may include some of the following points:

Agree

Christians can take the Eucharist for granted if it becomes too common / Jesus never said how often we should re-enact his final meal / people would appreciate the Eucharist more and prepare better for receiving if it were less frequent / the Eucharist has lost its meaning and is simply another part of the weekly act of worship / too many people receive Communion today without ever stopping to think about its meaning / it could become a meaningless and empty ritual if received too often – some Protestant denominations only receive once or twice a month, e.g. Baptists and Methodists / some denominations do not receive the Eucharist at all, e.g. Salvation Army and Quakers.

Other views

Christians can feel the presence of God every time they receive Communion and be strengthened by it / the Eucharist is spiritual food for everyday life and therefore cannot be taken too often / Christians need to be continually reminded of the sacrifice Jesus made for them and share in this event by carrying out his instructions to remember it / Jesus told Christians to "Do this in memory of me" / they are obliged to regularly obey his command / it has been an important aspect of the life of the Roman Catholic Church for centuries to receive the Eucharist / receiving the Eucharist is the highlight and focal point of the celebration of Mass / people might only go to Church on these special occasions and neglect their faith if the Eucharist were not offered.

(c) Describe the ways in which Roman Catholics receive the Eucharist.

Candidates may include some of the following points:

Eucharistic ministers receive bread and wine from the priest / congregation come out of seats and in lines approach the altar / kneel or stand in a line or in a circle around the altar / priest or eucharistic minister takes bread out of chalice or appropriate dish between thumb and first and second finger / holds bread up in front of communicant and says "The Body of Christ" / communicant's response is "Amen" / communicant receives by mouth or by hand from priest or eucharistic minister / communicant returns to seat and gives thanks to God / wine (the blood of Christ) is generally not offered at daily or Sunday Masses as congregation is too large / generally offered on special occasions, e.g. weddings, etc. / Communion can be brought to people in their seats if unable to walk to altar / Communion can also be brought to the home of those who are sick by the priest or eucharistic minister / Roman Catholics can receive once a day but mostly on Sundays during the Mass.

Candidates may include some of the following points:

Agree

Christians believe that by receiving the Eucharist they are receiving the actual body and blood of Jesus – Transubstantiation (Roman Catholic belief) – spiritual food / others believe that the Eucharist is only a symbol of Jesus' body and blood – Real Presence (belief of many Anglicans) although there is no actual change in the bread and wine they do believe that Jesus is present as they receive it and that 'receiving' brings them closer to Jesus.

Other views

Others feel that they can get just as close to Jesus through prayer / reading the Bible / listening to the Word of God in Church services / doing good for others, e.g. charity work, missionary work, voluntary work / self sacrifice, e.g. Lent, CAFOD or Trocaire / going on a pilgrimage or retreat / through receiving any of the sacraments – reconciliation, confirmation, etc. / for many Protestants, the bread and wine are just symbols of Jesus' saving death, so direct religious experience (through prayer, a vision, etc.) would bring them closer to Christ.
