



Candidates may include some of the following points:

Jews are not pacifists / war is an acceptable last resort when discussions have failed / there cannot and should be no negotiation with terrorists / Judaism teaches that Milchemet mitvah (obligatory war) commanded by God / a war of self defence is considered an obligatory war / defence against terrorism can be considered self defence / Milchemet reshut (optional war) can also be to prevent a greater calamity / Jewish history is full of conflict and war commanded by God for example Joshua and the Israelites fought for the promised land / it is a religious obligation to defend your own life and those of your family in Judaism.

Candidates may include some of the following points:

Agree

Judaism teaches that God forgives Jews for their wrong doing, they should follow his example and forgive others / peace is an ideal in Judaism / violence caused in war is not peaceful / Judaism regards war as evil / Judaism promotes peace between nations as the ideal, so war should unthinkable (Leviticus 26 6) / Judaism teaches that peace will happen in the Messianic Age (Isaiah 2 4) / for this reason they promote negotiation and reconciliation in case of dispute / the Amidah prayer stresses peace / Psalm 29 11 stresses that God will give his people peace, therefore as his chosen people Jews should promote it / it is important that Jews should practice their teachings.

Other views:

There are some circumstances when war is necessary / Milchemet mitvah clearly states that war is necessary if you are attacked first or you need to pre-empt and attack / Milchemet reshut states that war is necessary if diplomacy has failed (Judges 11 ¹²⁻³³) religious authority approves it and there are sound reasons for the conflict / there is the concept of Kiddush Hashem which is martyrdom in the name of God, clearly this could not happen if conflict was not a part of Jewish teaching and ideology / sometimes war is necessary for the greater good / credit specific examples of when this is the case for example when a hostile dictator is ruling a country / breaches of human rights.

Many Jews accept that nuclear weapons are a major threat to the human race / however, they also accept that they serve the purpose of keeping the peace / since the second world war there have been no world wars because of the deterrent effect of nuclear weapons / however Maimonides forbid wanton destruction / the Midrah teaches that in war, civilians must be able to emigrate / for these reasons some Jews might not support the use of nuclear weapons.

Candidates may include some of the following points:

Agree

Suffering gives people a change to learn and grow from the experience / suffering allows people to help one another / suffering helps people to empathise with others / it can bring previously hidden qualities out of a person / many Jews would insist that God can be met through the experience of suffering / in the Torah, God made Job suffer therefore Jews should accept it as part of God's plan.

Other views

Suffering is sometimes of such great scale and amount that it is difficult to see what may be learned from it / suffering can harden people / suffering often afflicts the innocent / many people's experience of suffering causes them to inflict more suffering on others.
