Baisakhi 1699 / Sikhs being persecuted / Guru Gobind Singh called all Sikhs to attend meeting at Anandpur / need to form fighting force / asked who was prepared to die / eventually one man came forward / Guru took him to a tent and beheaded him / repeated 5 times / returned with the 5 men dressed as Pianje Piare (beloved ones) / initiated into Khalsa with Amrit ceremony / introduced 5Ks and names Singh and Kaur / others initiated when they understood what Guru intended.
