

Target: Knowledge of initiation ceremonies in two religions

Islam Whispering the Adhan and the Igamah at birth / Tahneek when the

baby comes home / Aqiqa (head shaving) after seven days / Khitian

(circumcision) up to the age of ten.

Judaism Brit Milah (circumcision) at 8 days for boys / naming of girls in the

synagogue after a week / Bar and Bat Mitzvah at 13 and 12

respectively.

Sikhism Whispering the Mool Mantar at birth / naming ceremony at the

gurdwara / amrit ceremony after the age of 16.

Accept the answer that there is no initiation ceremony in Islam and award up to 3 marks if the reason is explained: being Muslim consists of believing the Shahadah and submitting to Allah.

Award a maximum of 4 marks if an initiation ceremony in only one religion is described.

5 (b) Explain differences that belonging to a religion might make to the life of a young person.

Target: Understanding of implications of belonging to a religion

Candidates may include some of the following points:

Following religion's behaviour code / keeping dietary rules / giving a certain amount of money to charity / spending time in prayer or meditation / attending a place of worship / celebrating religious festivals / being prepared to marry someone from the same religion, perhaps chosen for them.

5 (c) 'Getting married in a religious ceremony should only be for people who belong to that religion by initiation.'

What do you think? Give your opinion.

Target: Personal opinion on appropriateness of observing one rite of passage without observing an earlier one

This will be a personal response to the issue.

Candidates may include some of the following points:

Couple more likely to be committed to their religion if they have been through an initiation ceremony / marriage and initiation are both rites of passage so should go together / someone who has not been initiated into a religion may not be a believer so religious marriage won't mean much.

Buddhists do not have religious marriage ceremony / everyone who wants to marry should be allowed to do so how they want / people from different religions should be allowed to marry each other / whether couple love each other is more important than whether they belong to the religion.

5 (d) 'Rites of passage are more important in a religion than celebrating religious festivals.'

Do you agree? Give reasons for your answer, showing that you have thought about more than one point of view. Refer to religious arguments in your answer.

Target: Evaluation of the importance of rites of passage compared to that of festivals

Levels	Criteria	Marks	Quality of Written Communication

Candidates may include some of the following points:

Agree

Rites of passage (except funerals) involve commitment to living a religious life whereas celebrating festivals does not / funerals comfort people after death when they do not feel like celebrating a festival / many non-religious people join in festivals so it is harder to tell who is serious about their religion.

Other views

The whole community joins in a festival whereas rites of passage involve a smaller group / the beliefs and teachings of a religion are shown just as clearly in a festival / festivals involve just as much prayer and worship / some festivals have a much more obvious link to the founders of the religion than rites of passage do.
