4(c)		<p>The main reasons are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • He learned that it can promote self-discipline and non-attachment • This influenced the lifestyle he suggested for the sangha • He saw that it cannot lead to Nibbana as it becomes an end in itself • It is one of the factors which inspired him to search for the Middle Way <p>Answers which only describe rather than explain will not go beyond level 2. 6(c)		<p>The main reasons are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • It reminds Buddhists of the Buddha's first exposition of the Middle Way at Sarnath • It marks the beginning of the rainy season and/or the full moon in the month of Asalha • It is a time for reflection, study and meditation • Some lay people leave behind their ordinary lives during this period and renew their commitment to the Dhamma • Bhikkus end the period by sharing assessments of one another's characters • It is an opportunity to gain good kamma <p>Answers which only describe rather than explain will not go beyond level 2. Other approaches are possible and must be marked according to the levels. If you are unsure of the validity of an answer, it must be sent to review.</p>
