Lotteries Fund allocates \$150 million to welfare programmes

The Lotteries Fund allocated \$150,720,200 to finance various social welfare service programmes from April to June this year, a Social Welfare Department spokesman said today (August 2).

Of the total, \$78,823,974 went to social welfare support, \$31,826,223 went to rehabilitation services, \$25,689,872 went to elderly and medical social services, \$8,225,967 went to family and child welfare services, \$5,149,006 went to youth services and \$ 1,005,158 to community development.

The fund was established to finance, by way of grants, loans or advances, the operation or development of social welfare services and medical or educational projects with a welfare content, the spokesman said.

Question 7

Read the following news clipping about an Austrian girl who was kidnapped when she was small. Then answer questions a and b.



In March 1998, while on her way to school, Austrian girl Natascha Kampusch, 10, was kidnapped and was locked up in a small room by the kidnapper for eight years. Last month, she successfully ran away from the room and was found 'half-starved, pale and weeping' on the street, police said.

Now, aged 18, Natascha is under the care of a group of doctors, care workers and psychiatrists in hospital. Although she was able to provide the police with a lot of useful information, she has explicitly asked the police not to disclose any specific details to third parties, including her parents.

Details released about her eight years in captivity reveal that her kidnapper was a distant relative of the family. The kidnapper committed suicide after he found out that Natascha had escaped from the hidden small room at the back of the garage of his home.

Natascha told the police that she was kept in a 5-square-metre room in which there was a bed and a toilet. She was also given basic clothing, food to eat, books to read and a radio to listen to, according to what she told the police.

The teenager, who is 1.6 metres tall, weighs only 42 kg. Over the past eight years, Natascha has mainly fed on bread and cold meat, with hardly any fruit and vegetables.

"I asked myself over and over again: Why me?" Natascha told the police. "I have never given up hope of running away, but I found that life is so unfair to me," she said. When she heard the news that police believed that she was dead and were starting to look for her body, she felt extremely sad and hopeless. "I will never be found", she thought. ■**News abridged from Reuters in Vienna**
