 - how many people are in the band
 - the type of music the band plays
 - where you practise
 - how often you play for the public
 - how much you earn.

Vocabulary: leisure, entertainment.

Grammatical structures: verbs mainly in the present tense.

 - how many rooms the apartment has
 - what kind of rooms they are
 - one characteristic of the apartment
 - how much rent each person will pay
 - how you can be contacted.

Does the candidate use spelling, vocabulary and grammatical structures correctly?

Vocabulary: home.

Grammatical structures: verbs mainly in the present and future tenses.

Note: the text may still contain some grammatical errors in the highest markband.

Criterion A: Language (maximum [8 marks])

Please refer to the Language ab initio guide (March 2011).

Does the candidate use a range of vocabulary and grammatical structures?

Vocabulary: tourism; food; weather.

Grammatical structures: short, simple sentences.

Tenses: the present and the past.

Does the candidate show an awareness of the appropriate register for the task?

Register: semi-formal.

Criterion B: Message (maximum [8 marks])

Please refer to the *Language ab initio guide* (March 2011).

Are the ideas well-developed?

Ideas: relevant, comprehensive, some details.

Is there evidence of a logical structure?

Introduction: reference to the stay / welcome and an explicit "thank you".

Development (2 or 3 paragraphs):

- first paragraph: thank you and invitation
- second paragraph: what you enjoyed most in their country
- third paragraph: what they will see and do in your country.

Conclusion: this may be written in a variety of ways.

Are cohesive devices used effectively?

Cohesive devices: first, next ...; also, moreover ...

Criterion C: Format (maximum [2 marks])

Does the candidate use the appropriate format?

Text type – Informal letter: date, greetings, final formula, signature.

4. As class representative you send a leaflet to all parents from your school inviting them to attend an International Day at the school. Describe the programme for the day: mention some of the activities. Explain why this day is important for the students and parents. Write the text of the *leaflet*.

Criterion A: Language (maximum [8 marks])

Please refer to the Language ab initio guide (March 2011).

Does the candidate use a range of vocabulary and grammatical structures?

Vocabulary: education; internationalism.

Grammatical structures: short, simple sentences. Tenses: principally the present and the future.

Does the candidate show an awareness of the appropriate register for the task?

Register: formal or semi-formal.

Criterion B: Message (maximum [8 marks])

Please refer to the *Language ab initio guide* (March 2011).

Are the ideas well-developed?

Ideas: relevant, some details.

Is there evidence of a logical structure?

Introduction: purpose of the leaflet: invitation to international day.

Development (2 or 3 paragraphs):

- details of the day's activities
- explanation of why it is important to support this event/why the event is important.

Conclusion: this may be the expression of encouragement to attend.

Are cohesive devices used effectively?

Cohesive devices: first, next ...; also, therefore ...

Criterion C: Format (maximum [2 marks])

Does the candidate use the appropriate format?

Text type – Leaflet: title, subtitles/bullet-points.

5. Every month your I.B. English class posts messages on a blog for a class in an English speaking country. This month your teacher has suggested that you write about the educational system in your country. Write the *blog entry* describing your country's school system.

Criterion A: Language (maximum [8 marks])

Does the candidate use a range of vocabulary and grammatical structures?

Vocabulary: education.

Grammatical structures: short, simple sentences: a variety of tenses principally the present indicative.

Does the candidate show an awareness of the appropriate register for the task?

Register: semi-formal.

Criterion B: Message (maximum [8 marks])

Please refer to the *Language ab initio guide* (March 2011).

Are the ideas well-developed?

Ideas: relevant.

Is there evidence of a logical structure?

Introduction: introduces the topic of education. Development: details of educational system.

Conclusion: this will vary from candidate to candidate.

Are cohesive devices used effectively?

Cohesive devices: first, next ...; also, moreover ...; on the other hand, however ...

Criterion C: Format (maximum [2 marks])

Does the candidate use the appropriate format?

Text type – Blog: Form of address / opening greeting(s), form of closure / concluding remarks.
