Murad Badshah, MA, rickshaw fleet captain and land pirate, at your service. Allow me to begin at the outside and move in.

Huge (and also massive, enormous, and gigantic) describes me well. I am very, very rarely called fat. Perhaps you smile thinking this is because I inspire a certain sense of caution in more modestly proportioned persons? I must most respectfully take issue with you on this matter,

- and I beg your indulgence as I present a simple proof.
 - What is fat?

"Fat" is a small word which belies its size in the girth of its connotations. Fat implies a certain ungainliness, an inefficiency, a sense of immobility, a lack of industry, an unpleasant, unaesthetic available unperformed unperformed

10 quality; unmotivated, unloved, unnatural, unusual, uninspired, unhappy, unlikely to go places or to fit, under the ground with a heart attack at fifty-five. In short, fat somewhat paradoxically involves the lack of many attributes which, you must concede, are generally held to be good.

When the word "fat" is mentioned, people do not tend to think of the awesomely powerful rhinoceros, the supremely efficient and magnificent sperm whale, the deadly grizzly of North America. They do not say, "fat as a well-fed tiger." No, they say, "fat as a pig," a creature which eats its own feces and has never in our literature been a symbol of dignity.

Very well, then. The collective consciousness has assigned to fat a meaning, and as I speak this language I must accept fat on these terms. Fat is bad.

And so I am certain you will not disagree when I say the word can hardly be considered to 20 apply to me. I am weighty, yes, but I carry my mass wonderfully. I am quick, light on my feet, and 21 graceful. I have poise; delicacy and elegance characterize my every movement. My fingers are 22 nimble, my hands deft. It is no secret that I dance well and most willingly. Furthermore, I possess 23 those very qualities the lack of which is assumed by the word "fat": industry, drive, dexterity, 24 cunning. I am the living embodiment of so many unfat qualities that their enumeration would be

a project of enormous scope.

If A has fundamental characteristics the very absence of which characterize B, it cannot be said with any degree of accuracy (or, may I add, sophistication) that A is B.

Thus, I am not fat. Quod erat demonstrandum*.

But I do stutter, it is true.

Nighttime Fires

When I was five in Louisville we drove to see nighttime fires. Piled seven of us, all pajamas and running noses, into the Olds*, drove fast toward smoke. It was after my father

- 5 lost his job, so not getting up in the morning gave him time: awake past midnight, he read old newspapers with no news, tried crosswords until he split the pencil between his teeth, mad. When he heard the wolf whine of the siren, he woke my mother,
- 10 and she pushed and shoved us all into waking. Once roused we longed for burnt wood and a smell of flames high into the pines. My old man liked driving to rich neighborhoods best, swearing in a good mood as he followed fire engines that snaked like dragons
- 15 and split the silent streets. It was festival, carnival.

If there were a Cadillac or any car in a curved driveway, my father smiled a smile from a secret, brittle heart. His face lit up in the heat given off by destruction

- 20 like something was being made, or was being set right. I bent my head back to see where sparks ate up the sky. My father who never held us would take my hand and point to falling cinders that covered the ground like snow, or, excited, show us
- the swollen collapse of a staircase. My mother watched my father, not the house. She was happy only when we were ready to go, when it was finally over and nothing else could burn.Driving home, she would sleep in the front seat
- 30 as we huddled behind. I could see his quiet face in the rearview mirror, eyes like hallways filled with smoke.
