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
## SECTION B

### 2 Read Sources A and B.

#### Source A

Many UK residents were born in other countries. The graph below shows numbers of UK residents born in some of these countries in 2001 and 2011.

#### Source B

Aspects of culture can promote either division or bonding in communities. Differences in identity might explain why cultural events can promote division in communities. Concerts, plays and novels are often targets for criticism.

In 1988 the publication of *The Satanic Verses* by Salman Rushdie caused widespread offence. In 2004 in the UK, performances of the play *Behzti* (Dishonour) were cancelled after Sikhs protested about its content. In 2012, Madonna was criticised by some Russians for her view that gay people should have equal rights. In 2014, Robin Thicke was strongly criticised for promoting sexual violence towards women in the words and video for his song *Blurred Lines*. Bullfighting, which takes place in Spain and parts of South America, is another type of cultural event that arouses very strong feelings.

## SECTION C

### 3 Read Sources C and D

#### Source C

The United Nations develops rights and freedoms in a global context. According to the United Nations, some of the key achievements in human rights are as follows:

- human rights have become central to the global conversation regarding peace, security and development
- additional explicit protections in international law now exist covering different aspects of identity and regional institutions
- The United Nations Fund for Victims of Torture has assisted hundreds of thousands of victims of torture to rebuild their lives
- victims of trafficking are now regarded as entitled to the full range of human rights and are no longer perceived to be criminals

**Trafficking:** the trade in human beings for the purpose of forced labour, sexual slavery or commercial sexual exploitation.

#### Source D

Achievements in human rights include:

- 1 women's rights are now acknowledged as fundamental human rights
- 2 there is global consensus that serious violations of human rights must not go unpunished.

Despite these achievements, which followed the Universal Declaration of Human Rights [1948], the United Nations recognises that slavery continues to exist. This suggests that the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the Convention on the Rights of the Child [1989] have not protected people effectively.
