	accepted: by accepting the target, it indicates the desire to reach the agreed target. It also allows the coach and performer to discuss and agree the way forward;		
	realistic: the target is achievable. If the target is not realistic performers see little point in trying to achieve it;		
	time related: keeping the targets within a short period of time allows targets to be achieved and interest maintained;		
	exciting: if the target is interesting the performer will want to work to achieve the target;		
	recorded: by recording results the performer will be able to see the progress they have made;
