Scenario 1

SHIIDENHOUNKY.COM Liz and Anne celebrated the registration of their civil partnership in 2009. There are two children, James and Rebecca. James was born in 2005 to Anne and her husband at that time, Dan. James has no contact with his father. Rebecca, born in 2010, was adopted by Liz and Anne in 2011.

Liz works as a nurse on a part-time basis and is the main carer for the children, taking them to school and picking them up each day. Anne is a doctor who works long and unsociable hours; her high income supports the whole family and enables Liz to stay at home with the children. The house the family live in is owned jointly by Anne and Liz. Anne also owns an apartment near the coast in her sole name, has substantial savings and she will receive a generous pension. Liz has no savings or pension provision.

Liz has been upset that recently Anne has seemed to work even more than usual. Quite often Anne is late home and Liz has heard rumours about an intimate relationship between Anne and one of her male colleagues.

Anne was very surprised when she came home one day last week and found the house empty. There was a note from Liz saying that she had taken the children to stay with her parents and that she did not know when they would be back. Anne has since spoken to Liz on the telephone and asked her to bring the children home so that she can see them. She is very concerned that Liz was able to take the children away from her and may make it difficult for her to see them.

Scenario 2

Student Bounty.com Mikhail and Irena have been married for 12 years. They have no children. is the owner of a number of businesses. Irena takes care of their large co home and supports Mikhail in making his businesses successful by entertain. his associates with lavish parties.

Mikhail provides Irena with a very good allowance as he is aware of her contribution to his business success and wants her to have a nice lifestyle. Mikhail was disappointed to discover that when he was away on business, Irena has had relationships with other men. Irena explained to Mikhail that she was lonely whilst he was away. Mikhail forgave Irena for these relationships.

Mikhail had believed that both he and Irena wanted to have children. However, Irena recently told him that she has had surgery preventing her from having children. Mikhail was devastated by this and finds the situation intolerable.

Scenario 3

Ria believes they are common-law husband and wife having go through a ceremony in the commune which consisted of an informal blessing and celebration. Nothing was signed and the commune officer who presided over the ceremony was not officially registered.

A few years ago Ria, Jack and Christabelle left the commune. They bought an old house which was registered in Jack's name. Jack paid the deposit and pays the mortgage. Ria carried out the majority of the renovation to the house and has continued to make many improvements to it since. As a result of Ria's work the value of the house has increased.

Ria and Jack have now separated. Jack still lives in the house and Ria has moved in with her parents.

Christabelle is currently living with Jack and Ria has seen Christabelle regularly since the separation. Ria would like Christabelle to live with her. Christabelle says she wants to live with Ria but Jack believes that Christabelle is not old enough to decide where she lives.
