On the lawn the children stopped chanting. They all turned to stare at him in amazement. Their faces were pale and triangular in the dusk. The trees and bushes around them, spilling long shadows across them. 30

"Don't be a fool," Raghu said roughly. "If you want to play, you can stand at the end of the line."

The game proceeded. Ravi felt his heart go heavy and ache unbearably. He lay down on the damp grass, no longer crying, silenced by a terrible sense of his insignificance. 35
