TEXT A

Gerald Durrell

This is an extract from a biography of Gerald Durrell – conservationist and author.

- 1 Gerald Durrell was born in India on 7th January 1925. Following the sad death of his father three years later, in 1928, the family sailed back to live in England for a while. However, Gerald's oldest brother, Lawrence, encouraged his mother to buy a house on the island of Corfu in Greece, where the climate was much warmer. The family
- 5 settled here for four years.

In Corfu, Durrell's huge interest in animals and all living things developed. This was fuelled by a friendship with Dr Theodore Stephanides (a Greek poet, author, doctor and naturalist). His own fascination with the animal world encouraged the ten year old Gerald.

- 10 In 1939, with World War II coming, the Durrell family moved back to the United Kingdom and settled in the quiet seaside town of Bournemouth. The young Gerald first started work in a local pet shop and then went on to learn about horse care as a stable-hand and riding instructor. After the war he became a student zoo keeper at London's Whipsnade Park, where he gained experience with a much wider variety of
- 15 animals.

At the age of 21, an inheritance of three thousand pounds enabled Gerald to launch his animal-collecting career. This was used to finance, organise and lead his first animal-collecting expedition to the British Cameroons in West Africa. For the next ten years he travelled to many distant parts of the world, acquiring animals for the major

- 20 British zoological gardens.

During brief breaks between these expeditions, Gerald launched on a second career. Encouraged by Lawrence, he began writing amusing stories of his animal adventures for magazines and radio broadcasts. He went on to publish his first book in 1953. He eventually wrote thirty-seven books, many based on his own interesting childhood.

- 25 Gerald's unique insight into the animal kingdom, and the humour with which he described his adventures, made him one of the most widely-read authors of animal stories. The humorous account of his Corfu childhood, in the book 'My Family and Other Animals', has sold millions of copies worldwide. His books, written for both children and adults, have been translated into 31 languages. Gerald also hosted
- 30 seven television series as well as making many, many appearances on television and radio programmes.

Gerald Durrell died on January 7th 1995, in Jersey, aged 70. He left a huge mark on the conservation world and a valuable legacy for future generations. Gerald's mission and vision continue through the tireless work of dedicated conservationists

- 35 throughout the world.

The Jersey Wildlife Park was originally founded by Gerald in 1963. Its symbol is the dodo! It was renamed the Durrell Wildlife Park – in its founder's honour – in 1999, and has Princess Anne as its patron. Today, it continues to provide a sanctuary for some of the rarest animals in the world. Visitors, young and old, are able to learn 40 stories of the inhabitants' fight for survival in the wild. The Jersey Wildlife Trust encourages young children and teenagers to become actively involved in carrying on the work of the legendary Gerald Durrell.

TEXT B

My Family and Other Animals

As a young boy Gerald Durrell was captivated by the wildlife which lived around his family home in Corfu. One day he found a female scorpion and her babies in the garden wall.

- 1 I made up my mind to smuggle them into the house and up to my bedroom so that I might keep them and watch them grow up. With great care, I manoeuvred the mother and family into a matchbox and then hurried home. It was unfortunate that just as I entered the house lunch was ready. However, I placed the matchbox carefully
- 5 on the mantelpiece , so that the scorpions should get plenty of air and joined the family for the meal. Dawdling over my food, feeding Roger under the table and listening to the family arguing, I completely forgot about my exciting new captures. Larry, having finished, picked up the matchbox. Oblivious of my impending doom I watched him as he opened it.
- 10 Now I maintain to this day that the female scorpion meant no harm. She was a trifle annoyed at being shut up in a match box for so long, and so she seized the first opportunity to escape. She hoisted herself out of the box, her babies clinging on desperately and scuttled on to the back of Larry's hand. There, not quite certain what to do next, she paused. Larry, feeling the movement of her claws, glanced down to
- 15 see what it was, and from that moment things got increasingly confused.

He uttered a roar of fright that made Lugaretzia, our maid, drop a plate and brought Roger out from beneath the table, barking wildly. With a flick of his hand he sent the unfortunate scorpion flying down the table, and she landed, scattering babies like confetti. Leslie leapt to his feet, overturning his chair, and flicked out desperately

- 20 with his napkin, sending the scorpion rolling across the table to Margo, who promptly let out a scream. Mother, completely bewildered by this change from peace to chaos, put on her glasses and peered down the table to see what was causing the commotion, and at that moment Margo hurled a glass of water at the advancing scorpion. The shower missed the animal completely, but successfully drenched
- 25 mother, who, not being able to stand cold water, lost her breath and sat gasping at the end of the table. The scorpion had now hidden itself under a plate, while her babies swarmed wildly all over the table.

Roger, mystified by the panic, ran round and round the room barking. As no-one had bothered to explain things to him, he thought that the family were being attacked,

- 30 and that it was his duty to defend them and so he bit Lugaretzia on the ankle. This did not help matters very much.

While the family, still simmering with rage, went to the drawing room I spent half-an-hour rounding up the babies, picking them up in a teaspoon and returning them to their mother. Then I carried them outside on a saucer and reluctantly

- 35 released them on the wall. Roger and I went and spent the afternoon on the hillside.
