

TEXT 1

The Wonderful Green Sea Turtle

The green sea turtle is one of the largest of its kind. Over 80 countries have green sea turtles nesting on their beaches worldwide. They are incredible creatures, but sadly they are in great danger of extinction from our planet.



Did you know?

- they can hold their breath for hours at a time
- green sea turtles are only 5 cm long when they are born, but they can grow up to 1.5 metres in length
- they weigh over 300 kg
- they can swim at speeds of up to 56 km per hour
- they are the largest of the hard-shell sea turtles.

The dorsal (back) curved shell of the green turtle is wide, smooth, and brownish green in colour. The shell's underside is yellow. Turtle heads cannot retract into their bodies yet many people believe they can. Their shell and flippers help them to swim quickly and gracefully.

Nesting

To reach their nesting grounds, green turtles migrate long distances. They travel back to the beaches where they were born. Wow! They are nimble underwater but cannot move easily on land. They are slow and struggle to pull themselves along with their flippers. Usually, female green turtles only venture onto land to lay their eggs. Each turtle lays 100–200 eggs at a time in a pit in the sand and leaves them alone for two months. Once hatched, baby turtles must crawl to the water themselves and try to avoid enemies such as birds and crabs.



Endangered!

Green turtle numbers are falling drastically. They are hunted and their eggs are collected by humans, which is allowed in some countries. Green turtles are also threatened because their nesting areas are being destroyed in many places. Sometimes green turtles are accidentally caught in fishing nets, which also decreases their population.

Thankfully, there are efforts to reduce the number of turtles and eggs stolen. Also, many countries are trying to protect the nesting grounds with agreements and laws.

How can you help?


Green sea turtles need as many supporters as they can get. Don't buy products made from this endangered species! Remember, if you live an area that green turtles use for nesting, you can encourage everyone to respect and protect the beaches where eggs are laid.

TEXT 2

The Boy Who Met A Whale

Razi, a local fisher boy, is watching turtle eggs hatch when he sees a boat coming into view. This is just the beginning of a breath-taking adventure for him and his friends.

The baby turtle scuttled down the golden beach, wet and gritty with sand. Bit by bit scores of others emerged, their shiny black bodies, flailing limbs and beady eyes glinting in the early morning sun. They scampered towards the water, their little legs scuffling over the freshly turned-up sand. A bale of tiny turtles – all eager to make their first meeting with the sea.



Razi laughed as he ran after them, careful not to step on any of the little creatures. The sight never failed to thrill him and lift his spirits. He'd seen it a hundred times, coming early to this stretch of beach to watch the newly hatched turtles running into the sea at sunrise. There was a white one among them, an albino turtle, the pattern on its back etched out in shiny black lines. It was lagging behind and in danger of getting lost.

"Go on! Go, your friends are leaving!" called Razi. He knew not to touch it and hoped instead that his voice would cheer it on. Sure enough, the white turtle perked up and scuttled after the others.

Overhead, a yellow-beaked ibis wheeled past. Razi kept an eye on it in case it tried to attack the babies.

The sea was a greyish blue, deepening gradually to a brilliant turquoise with the rising sun shining on the waves. Coconut trees fringed the beach, their wiry trunks twisted like swaying cobras.

Standing on the shoreline, Razi watched in awe. A wave came in, drenching the baby turtles as they swarmed up to meet it. They hopped into the water, greeting it playfully. Razi held his breath. This part always worried him. The turtles looked so tiny and fragile. But the whole lot of them swam away happily, dots of black on the rolling blue waves surging into the great ocean.

He sat cross-legged on the sand and watched them bob away. They disappeared quickly, swimming away to their new lives. He knew that turtles always came back to the very same beach they were born in to lay their own eggs. So someday when Razi was an adult he could be back here and see the babies of one of these same turtles.

It was a lovely feeling. But it couldn't completely dislodge the sadness that dimmed Razi's world, no matter how the sun shone and waves danced.
